HOUSE GIVES OVATION TO 'THE ACE OF ACES.' Washington, Feb. 11.—Capt. Edward V. Rickenbacker, "the ace of aces" of the American air force, was given an ovation when he appeared today in the gallery of the house of representatives. He was the only member of the air force to be present at the session. Members and visitors arose and applauded for several minutes while the aviator stood rigidly at attention.

ELECTION DAY STRIKE IS CALLED IN CHICAGO. Chicago, Feb. 11.—A call for a one-day general strike of union labor in Chicago on April 1, the date of the municipal election, was issued today by Morton L. Johnson, executive secretary in charge of the new labor party's headquarters. The purpose, the secretary's statement declared, "is not alone to enable the union workers to vote but to give them an opportunity to spend the day at the polls working in the interest of the labor business."

WOMAN'S TEMPLE SOLD AND WILL BE TORN DOWN. Chicago, Feb. 11.—The Woman's Temple, erected nearly a quarter of a century ago through the efforts of the late Frances E. Willard and the Woman's Christian Temperance union, today was sold by the trustees of the Field Museum of Natural History to the State Bank of Chicago for \$550,000 cash. The bank plans to erect a 16-story building in its place.

CHARGED WITH PLOT AGAINST WILSON'S LIFE. Alleged I. W. W. Leader, Who Threatened President After Prison Term Held at Cleveland. Kansas City, Feb. 11.—Pietro Pierre, alleged I. W. W. leader, was arrested today by federal officers in Cleveland, O., according to messages from there. He was charged with an alleged conspiracy against the life of President Wilson, say local government agents, and is held on \$10,000 bond.

Plotted Also to Kill McAdoe. The alleged plot also included the murder of William G. McAdoe, former secretary of treasury, according to the secret service men. R. B. Hays, a Chicago I. W. W., is said to have told Pierre he had been chosen to do the work. The scheme is said to have been revealed through the loyalty of two Italian convicts serving sentences in the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth. The two prisoners were cellmates of Pierre, and to them he is said to have confided his secret.

Car Stolen in Omaha Found in Sioux Falls; Two Men in Custody. An automobile stolen in Omaha was recovered in Sioux Falls, S. D., and two men who gave the names of Lyons and Neice were arrested. Both were in the car which they told police they bought in Omaha. Acting Chief of Detectives Hays said the car belongs in Omaha. Lyons and Neice were arrested by Sioux Falls police upon a "tip" that they had a carload of booze. Later investigation showed they had a stolen car. It was learned that Lyons and Neice discarded several cases of whiskey at Laverne, Minn., while enroute to Sioux Falls with the car.

Consider Greek Claims. Paris, Feb. 11.—(Via Montreal).—The special committee, consisting of two representatives each from Great Britain, the United States, France and Italy, which the council of the great powers decided upon a week ago to examine into the claims of Greece in the peace conference, will meet Thursday of this week.

JAPAN HAS BIG ARMY READY TO HIT CHINA

Threatens Attack If Secret Treaties Are Made Public and Agreements Are Not Carried Out.

JAPAN DENIES IT TRIED TO RESTRAIN CHINA. Paris, Feb. 11.—The Havas agency gives out a statement by Viscount Chinda, the Japanese ambassador to Great Britain who now is representing his country at the peace conference here, declaring the reports to be untrue that Japan has exercised pressure on China to restrain the action of the Chinese delegates to the conference.

Washington, Feb. 11.—(By the Associated Press).—Officials of the State department declined to make any formal comment today on the Chinese-Japanese situation. The impression was given that the whole matter was being handled in Paris.

Demands Upon China. Upon arriving in Paris without the copies of the treaties which they had been instructed to use in seeking to break Japan's grip, the Chinese delegates made verbal reports of the substance of these treaties to some of the peace delegates of the other countries. The Japanese authorities to demand of China that it revoke this action on the part of its delegates and that it keep secret the treaties.

Pressure Becoming Unbearable. Although they so far have been able to resist the Japanese demands, the Chinese officials now say that the pressure is becoming unbearable. The Chinese president has approved by cable the action of the Chinese delegates in Paris in announcing their willingness to make public the treaties in spite of Japanese pressure.

China has asked, depending upon the impression made upon the accredited delegates from other countries, that the peace conference see the 21 demands made upon China by Japan in 1915 revoked and that the Chinese republic be removed definitely from the influence of Japan. The complete independence of China is asked under the protection of the league of nations.

Germany Planning to Raise New Army by Conscription

Berlin, Feb. 11.—Conscription of various classes of men up to 35 years of age will be decreed soon, according to information given the correspondent today.

Senator Sears' Bill to Promote Ignorance Shelved by Committee

Lincoln, Feb. 11.—The senate committee on education tonight voted to postpone indefinitely Senator Sears' bill making it a criminal offense for any one other than parent, guardian or persons especially authorized by the parent to give information of a sexual nature or relating to the so-called social diseases to children under 16 years of age.

New Capitol Bill Approved by Senate Finance Committee

Lincoln, Feb. 11.—The senate finance committee voted this afternoon to report out the house bill, by Representatives Tracewell and Mears providing for a levy of 1.5 mills for a period of six years to raise \$5,000,000 for the construction of a new capitol with a recommendation that it pass.
