ACTION TAKEN BY GROUPS ON BIG QUESTIONS

Millers Favor Minimum Price on Wheat; U. S. Most Solvent Nation in World, Say Bankers.

Millers—Favor minimum price of \$2.26 a bushel to producer for 1919 wheat crop. Declare for return of railroads and wire lines to private ownership. To appeal for congressional aid in developing water power of Transmississippi districts. Demand bolshevism be driven from American continent.

Civic Group—J. C. Pothersbridge of Kansas City, tells mayors that railroads give the government ownership as excuse for not bearing share of municipal improvements. Recommend speedy return of railroads to private ownership. Favor big program of public works to help solve employment problem.

Water Power—Consider resolution calling on congress to speed up water power legislation. Charles E. Ross, consulting engineer of Union Pacific, says Nebraska's congressmen are not helping this legislation.

Garment Manufacturers—Postpone meeting until 6:30 p. m. to hear Galbraith Miller, president of International Garment Manufacturers' association.

Bankers—United States is most solvent nation in world at present, says Melvin A. Traylor, president of First Trust company of Chicago. Tells bankers they must adjust themselves to new conditions. Resolutions adopted favoring return of railroads and wire lines to private ownership; encouraging public works for returned soldiers; development of foreign trade; co-operation between agriculture and other industries; higher interest rate on Victory Loan bonds.

Oil, Mining and Potash—Adopt resolutions calling on congress to protect American potash industry from German competition; urging secretary of interior to aid oil and allied industries, and favoring Walsh-Pittman bill to release government mineral lands for leasing.

Advertising and Selling—"Many big business men and government officials oppose advertising," says Merle Thorpe, editor of Nation's Business. "People should be educated to economic importance of advertising."

Live Stock—"Foreign people must be fed with American hogs," says E. Z. Russell of Department of Agriculture, Washington. "Mutton eating campaign," is suggested by J. S. Leavenworth of Wood River, Neb. "Wool used in clothing now on market is so inferior that goods do not hold together," says J. M. Wilson of Wyoming Wool Growers' association.

Building and Industry—"Wheat and other food products, instead of gold, form the measure of values," states John W. Towles, president of Omaha Structural Steel company. Contractors and builders say prices are not coming down, and advise immediate resumption of building activities.

Farm Machinery Group—Adopt recommendations for National Chamber of Agriculture; use of returned soldiers and sailors to prepare waste lands for farming; endorse good roads; adoption of English as universal language of country; publication of foreign language papers be discouraged; business be conducted in normal manner.

Farmers—Attempt to inject provincial school issues into meeting was defeated. Adopt resolution to regulate margin of profit between producer and consumer. Would limit railroad to 200 feet right of way. Governor, in speech, says there is no fear of bolshevism in this country. Is in favor of prohibiting foreigners to form colonies, and advocates the use of but one language.

Dairy Group—Editor of Kimball's Dairy Farmer urges more efficiency in the production of dairy products. Oleomargarine was scored by H. J. Credit, who says the consumption of the substitute has increased 162,000,000 pounds during the year. The high price of milk in cities was discussed, and this given as one of the reasons for the slump in the dairy business during the past year.

Mayors—Favor return of railroads to private control. Mayor of Kansas City says the government is principal obstacle to going ahead with public work, inasmuch as the railroads refuse to do their share as long as they are under control. To ask investigation of alleged profiteering.

Airman Killed by Fall.

March Field, Riverside Cal., Feb. 19.—Lieut. S. C. Allison of Balingier, Tex., died here today as the result of a fall while flying. Allison was driving a real control machine and fell into a tail spin at 200 feet.
