BOARD CHOOSES SITE OF SCHOOL OF COMMERCE

Will Be Located on Thirtieth, Between Cuming and Burt Streets; Plans Call for Up-to-date Building.

The site, from Cuming to Burt and from Thirtieth to within a half block of Thirty-third street, has been decided upon by the Board of Education as the location of the new High School of Commerce soon to be erected. Negotiations for its purchase are now pending and officials of the Board of Education plan to begin the preliminary work of grading the eight acres in the near future. Before construction can begin several houses, will have to be moved.

A million dollars will be expended in the construction of the new institution. The bonds were voted about a year ago but the government would not permit their sale at that time on account of the war. The bonds have been recently bought by a Boston firm with the permission of the government.

The place is easily accessible to all parts of Omaha. It can be reached by any street railway line in the city. This is one of its principal advantages, according to members of the board.

The majority of the 1,400 pupils attending the High School of Commerce reside north of Cuming street. The location will thus be convenient to the greater portion of the students, stated the secretary.

Plenty of Room.
The place is large enough to accommodate the enlarged and modern high school which is being planned. The site purchased at Twenty-second and Chicago streets a few years ago has proven too small for the rapidly growing institution. It is planned to utilize the Chicago street lot for the erection of a junior high school to be composed of Seventh, Eighth and Ninth grade students. This will relieve the crowded conditions in both our public and high schools.

The new High School of Commerce will be one of the most modern and best equipped in the country. It is planned to make it a technical as well as a commercial high school. Shops for the teaching of trades and facilities for teaching of home economics, mechanics, printing, carpentry, journalism and many other trades and professions will be installed.

The buildings on Leavenworth street, which compose the present High School of Commerce, will be condemned and torn down. Only the annex, recently constructed to accommodate the overflow of pupils, will be transferred to the new site.
