### Baltimore Director Says Big Leagues Are

Washington, March 26 .- What he ermed the monopolistic methods of organized base ball were described oday by L. Edwin Goldman, former director of the Baltimore club of the Federal league, testifying in the trial of the club's suit for damages under he Sherman anti-trust law against the National and American leagues.

The witness said when the Federal league started to break the "base ball monopoly," the organized in-terests controlled every club and every professional player in the United States, including 225 clubs and nearly 9,000 players. In support of his charge of monopolistic methods of the major leagues, he outlined the activities of the national commission, which, he said, acted as court and adjudged appeals from players, made rules and regulations for all the clubs and issued opinoins.
