Transport Aquitania Brings Troops of Western States From Overseas; Medical Officers Have Wives.

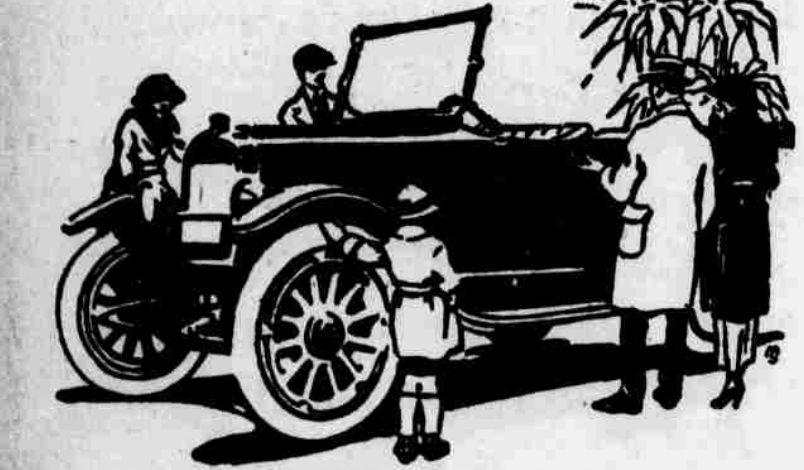
New York, March 30.—The transport Aquitania arrived here today from Brest, bringing 5,591 officers and enlisted men of the American expeditionary force, 69 war brides, 23 army nurses and 127 medical officers and enlisted men of base hospital No. 40.

Claims of British Labor Reviewed by Party Leader

Member of Parliament Advocates Better Housing, More Leisure, State Ownership, Labor Having Share in Control of Staple Industries and Equal Footing of People.

London, March 30.—In these days of nation-wide labor unrest, so pregnant with serious strikes and disorders throughout Britain, W. A. Adamson, M. P., chairman of the labor party in an interview told of the united claims of organized labor.

This sandy haired, two-fisted, broad shouldered ex-miner, who has fought his way up from the coal pit to the Hall of Parliament, where he sits as the opposition party leader, advocates:

- 1.—State ownership, labor having a share in the control of all staple industries.
- 2.—Better housing.
- 3.—More leisure.
- 4.—Economic security, and
- 5.—The right to work on an equal footing with all other sections of the people.

Talks Class Distinction

"During recent years," Mr. Adamson said, "and as a result of the war, there has been a growing awakening among the working classes that it is not really necessary in the interests of the empire that the great masses of the community should work and drudge for low wages while a favored few revel in luxury and have a good time."

Stop Royalty Payments

"I established the fact that nearly \$30,000,000 is paid in mining royalties annually to those who have no investments in the collieries and who have no part or lot in the mining of coal. This is a burden on coal that ought to be removed at once. It is just one of these examples of the manner in which the working classes of the country are robbed of a fair and equitable share of the fruits of their labor and it looms large in the minds of all intelligent working men."

Norwegian Steamer Sends Wireless Calls for Help

Boston, March 30.—The Norwegian steamship Ocean, bound from Liverpool to New York was reported in distress today about 150 miles off Cape Cod. The coast guard cutter Ossipee was ordered to the vessel's assistance from Portland, Me. Wireless calls for help were picked up at various stations along the New England coast.

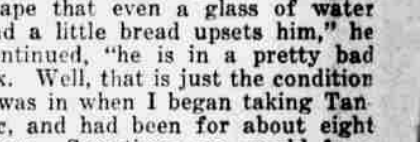
