New York, March 30 .- The transport Aquitania arrived here today from Brest, bringing 5,591 officers and enlisted men of the American expeditionary force, 69 war brides, 23 army nurses and 127 medical of-ficers and enlisted men of base hospital No. 40.

The troops on board included detachements of the 37th, 85th and 91st divisions. The largest unit was the 166th field artillery brigade, com-manded by Brigadier General B. F. Browne, The 166th Brigade com-prises the 347th and 348th regiments, 50 officers and 2,708 men.

Other units aboard the Aquitania lude seven companies of the 145th infantry, medical and company de-tachments of 146th infantry, field and staff headquarters and supply company 337th infantry, 166th field artillery brigade headquarters, 169th infantry, brigade headquarters and detachments of the 134th and 135th field artillery regiment, 112th am-munition train and 112th engineers.


