## **WOMEN GIVE UP** PLACES TO BOYS **BACK FROM WAR**

Forces in Packing Houses Are Cut, But Former Soldiers Given Preference in Employment.

More than 900 employes, many them women, have been released by the South Omaha packing houses in the last two weeks, according to figures made public by the packers at the request of the Federal Employment bureau.

The figures show that 11,000 men and women were on the payroll of the five packing houses. There are about 10,100 men now employed. Decreased hog receipts coupled with the withdrawal of government orders has forced the packing company to cut down their force.




