Congress Authorized Change. Master and Commissioner V. W. class legislation.

The commission contended that the act of congress authorizing the taking over of national transportation lines, while allowing the president to initiate rates, made them subject to revision, under the interstate commerce commission law which deals only with interstate rates and leaves all intrastate ratemaking power in the hands of state commissions.

Attorney La Master raised a point that the federal rates had been made after the signing of the armistice and the war emergency had been declared past by President Wilson. The argument of the defense was that the act of congress placing all police powers in the hands of the president gave the president exclusive power over rates.

Final Hearing Postponed. The commission's suit was filed as an original action in the Nebraska supreme court, December 31, and an alternative writ was issued, requiring the American railway ex-

press to install the Nebraska rates or show cause. The express company put the federal rates into effect the following day, January 1. The final hearing on the issue has been postponed from time to time to allow government officials to prepare their defense.


