"1. Labor shall not be held as commodity or article of commerce. "2. A standard adequate wage. "3. An eight-hour day.

"4. Equal pay for equal work by man or woman when of equal quantity and equal quality.

"5. Protection of child labor.

Difficulties Overcome.

"A great deal of difficulty was experienced at the sessions of the labor committee in Paris before the United States could become a party to the program," said Mr. Gompers. "This is due to the dual govern-ment of the United States-the state government and the federal government-with separate labor legislation. 

in Covenant of League Paris, April 11.—(By the Associated Press)—While the text of the Monroe doctrine amendment adopted by the league of nations commission at its session last night is withheld, its main features are substantially along the following lines:
Article X-Nothing in this covenant shall be construed as invalidating any agreement such as the Monroe doctrine for the maintenance of

The exact language of the amendment is closely guarded and efforts to obtain a copy of the text met with the statement that, although there is peculiar American interest in the amendment, there was no reason for departing from the definite policy of the commission not to disclose textual changes in the covenant as the work progresses.

The official statement on last night's session issued this morning does not mention the action on the Monroe doctrine amendment, al-though it has been admitted officially from other sources that the amendment was adopted.
