Ask Supreme Court to

Expedite Appeals in

Railroad Rate Cases

Washington, April 14.—The su-

preme court was asked in a motion

filed today by the government to

expedite consideration of the appeals

brought by the railroad adminis-

tration from North Dakota supreme

court opinions restraining Director

General Hines from increasing

freight and passenger rates in that

state under an order placed into

effect last June. The motion was

concluded in by the North Dakota

state authorities.

"The case," said the government's

brief, "presents the question of the

authority of the director general to

increase or to interfere with rates,

fares or charges established by a

state law or by the order of a state

regulating tribunal. The supreme

court of North Dakota has decided

against the authority claimed. Sim-

ilar suits involving the same ques-

tion are now pending in the courts

of South Dakota, Nebraska, Iowa,

Minnesota and Washington, and

other suits of like nature are threat-

ened in various other states of the

union.

"Infinitesimal confusion and uncertain-

ty must attend the operation of the

railroads by the government so long

as this question remains unsettled

and the state courts assert the right

to enjoin the collection by the di-

rector of general rates prescribed

by him."

Supt. W. W. Bradley states that

he expects hearty co-operation next

week in the observance of "Kindness

to Animals" week. The event will be

concluded on Sunday, April 27, by

a parade in the streets by Boy

Scouts. That day will be known

nationally as "Humane Sunday."

During the week all schools will

take cognizance of the occasion.

Teachers will impress the children
