London, April 14 .- Vickers, Ltd., are about to start a transatlantic air service with airships which the company was building for the British navy when the armistice was signed and which are no longer needed, the Pall Mall Gazette says. The passenger rate will be £48 and mail will be carried at the rate of £405 a ton. The pioneer ship will have a gas capacity of 1,200,000 cubic feet and engines of 1,000 horsepower. Larger ships are being designed to carry 200 passengers.
