Lincoln Member of State Parson Board Returns From Trip to Italy and France.

From a Staff Correspondent. Lincoln, April 23.—E. G. Maggi, Lincoln member of the state parson board, who has been in Italy in connection with the Y. M. C. A. work, returned to Lincoln yesterday. Mr. Maggi gives some interesting experiences of his trip. He was in Paris for a time and then went to Italy, where he visited most of the principal cities. He says that the Y. M. C. A. has done a wonderful work. "Of course some mistakes were made," said he, "as might naturally be expected in so huge an undertaking, and you people have heard, perhaps, of some of them, but when one takes into consideration the great things accomplished by the association there should be little criticism of the small mistakes."

Bank Does Big Business.

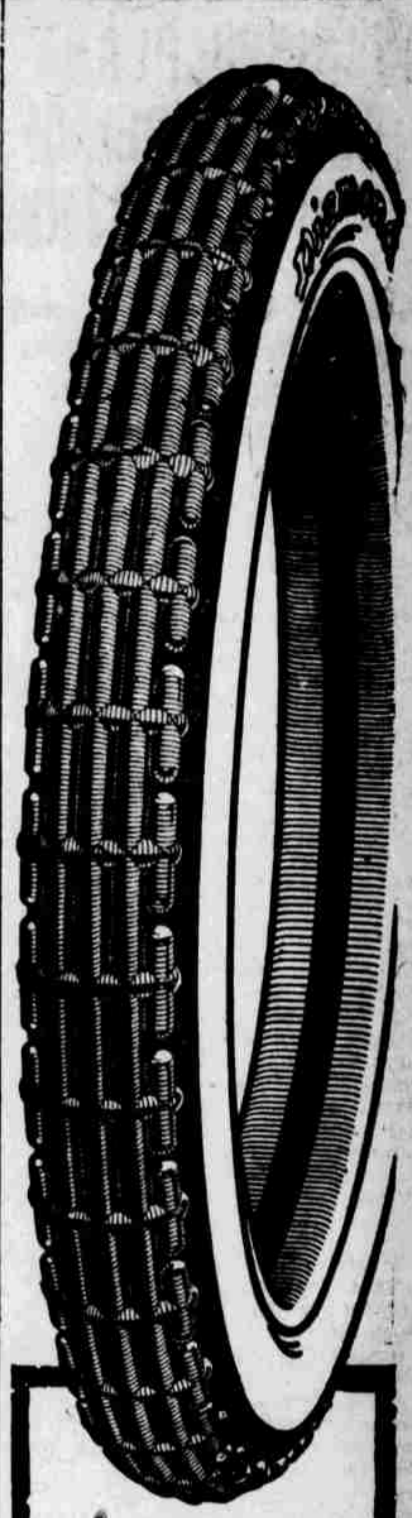
The Victory Loan bank in the courthouse did an encouraging business yesterday morning when it received subscriptions for more than \$70,000.

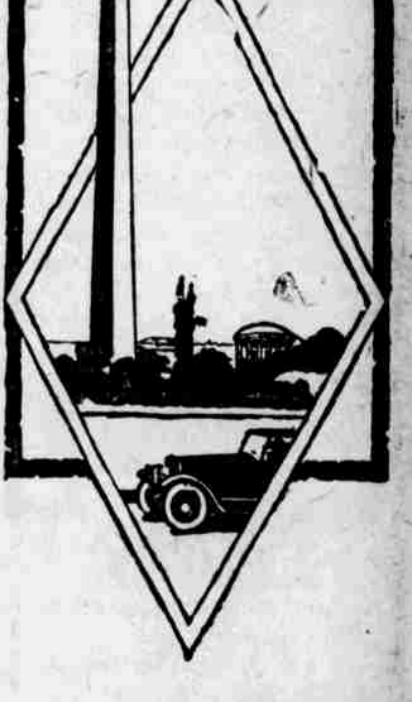
