

### HUGE BUILDING GAIN RECORDED DURING APRIL

Construction Work for Month Totals More Than Half Million Dollars; Many Permits Issued.

Building operations for April amounted to more than half a million dollars and were 25 per cent more than April of last year. The first four months of this year show an increase of 22 per cent more than the first four months of last year. April, 1919, \$513,275; April, 1918, \$410,480. First four months this year, \$1,342,647; first four months last year, \$1,109,960. Last month there were permits issued for the erection of 75 dwellings. George C. During the week a special train will carry out something like 50 families from Omaha. Most of the workers were former residents of Russia and since their arrival in the United States have annually worked in the beet fields.**
