

Instantly, prices of corn began to drop a cent at a time, automatic stop-loss selling orders came into play on a huge scale, and at the same time all support was temporarily paralyzed. Then, the truth became better known that only a moderate importation of wheat from Canada had been arranged for, and that no radical revision of foodstuffs prices was expected at present. Before the sensational collapse, the corn market influenced by continued weather, which made both hauling and planting nearly impossible, had soared to the highest prices yet this season. Oats were swayed entirely by the wild fluctuations of corn.

In the face of the sensational downturn of grain, provisions held relatively firm in line with the hog market. All of the day's advances in packing house products, however, were virtually wiped out.
