'Give Me Emotion or Give Me Death' Say the Frail Moths as They Singe Their Wings

A girl writes me: "If I act the way I want to with young men, i. e., decorously, I get no attention from them whatever. I also notice if we girls relax our standards of what is proper, we do not hold them long. It appears to be a choice of spinsterhood or a series of 'rushes' that frankly mean nothing more on the part of the men than the quest of a new girl and a good time."

She added that she was a worker who had been away from home for two years, and she signed her letter "Discouraged," and very frankly, I do not wonder at the signature. However, I think she is in the position of the rural citizen who went to New York, and after reading of two murders and a robbery in that village of seven million people, wrote to his home town paper that he arrived simultaneously with a tidal crime wave.

The girl is too young to realize and make allowances for the abnormal effect the world war has had on everything. If it had not been for the war very likely she would never have left home and had the experience which for the time being has made her a little bitter. Now, as the companion piece to the letter, or as the French say, "the reverse of the medal," I have a letter from a young man in which he says with somewhat brutal cynicism:

He Tries His Luck. "Of course, every fellow tries his luck in kissing a girl, and if she is willing, the new toy amuses him for awhile. But, believe me, Miss Fairfax, he is not picking an 'easy kisser' to eat his buckwheat cakes opposite to for ever after—it's too risky."

The situation is difficult. I'll admit—a young girl earning her living in a strange city, and apparently very likely every one has a "good time," is mistaken. She is too young, or not sufficiently world-wise to play the game—you see I am leaving out all questions of propriety, modesty, and the Victorian virtues—if you happen to be an ultra-modern young person who calls them such.

"Assume a virtue if you have it not," said Shakespeare in his wisdom. And if you happen to be what the brutally frank young man called a "girl-urchin" who craves excitement, jazzes, glitter, glare and tobacco-drenched food, don't expect to make a good match out of such hectic capital. You may have a good time as long as your youth is able to withstand the strain, but you won't have a good time long.

'Y' Joins Other Organizations To Get Laws Passed In State of New York.

Co-operating with the Consumers' League of New York State and New York City, the Women's Trades Union League, the W. C. T. U., the Industrial Commission of New York State, the New York State Suffrage Party and several other leading organizations, the Young Woman's Christian association of that state, numbering over 223,000 members, is uniting in an effort to pass through the New York state legislature bills providing for a minimum of protection for industrial women.

Among the bills for which they are unitedly working are the eight-hour day, minimum wage, health insurance and others of similar character. Recently a large protest mass meeting was held by the women of these various organizations in Cooper Union, New York City, for the purpose of showing their combined disapproval of an alleged attempt on the part of the speaker of the legislature to hold the bills in committee and prevent their being passed on by the legislators during the session.

Among the speakers was Mrs. Norman de R. Whitehouse, who just returned from Switzerland, where she performed a war mission for the committee of public information; Mrs. James Lees Laidlow, chairman of the New York State woman's suffrage party, who presided, and Mrs. William Adams Brown of the Y. W. C. A., who also recently returned from France, where she went on business for the Y. W. C. A. Mrs. Brown explained the policy of the Y. W. C. A. in these days in contrast to its earlier conservative policy by saying that with women going into industries to such an extent the Y. W. C. A., which always stood for women of every class, must be for protective measures and must therefore back the organizations endeavoring to pass them.

Make Rugs From Dog Skins

The making of rugs, sleeping mats and clothing from dog skins is an important industry in Manchuria. The dog hair is long, thick and of many colors, from a rich black through all shades and combinations of brown, yellow and gray to pure white, which is the finest, says the Detroit News. The extreme cold of the country develops the choicest dog skins in the world for size, length of hair and quality. Thousands of dog farms are found over southern Manchuria and eastern Mongolia. Each farm raises from 20 to several hundred dogs. In many cases the animals are traded in barter in place of money.

A bride's dowry often consists of a number of her father's finest dogs. The dogs are killed in midwinter when about eight months old, when the skins are at their best.
