OTHER STATES JOIN NEBRASKA TO WELCOME MEN

Governors of Missouri, Kansas, Colorado and Arizona in Accord With Plans of McKelvie.

Lincoln, May 16.—According to a letter received by Governor McKelvie today from Governor Allen of Kansas the latter is in full accord with the plan of the former for a joint program of the states interested in the homecoming of the 89th division and for a monster reception of the boys when they reach New York. In this the governors of Missouri and Colorado join, and Arizona, which has some men in that division, desires to be counted in. Governor McKelvie has received letters from Governors Gardner, Shoup and Campbell, respectively, of three states named, who enthusiastically commend the plan. Governor Allen of Kansas has appointed a special committee to go to New York, but Governor McKelvie desires the honors of being on such a committee to be delegated to anybody in Nebraska who wants to go. He does not want to leave anybody out.

APPROPRIATIONS OF LEGISLATURE \$15,714,440.82

State Institutions and Board of Control Get Most; Figures From Office of State Auditor.

Lincoln, May 16.—Deducting from the appropriations made by the legislature the items of \$3,987,575.66, estimated cash funds of the institutions and departments and the deficiency fund of \$316,778.53, appropriations of the last legislature will amount to \$15,714,440.82, according to figures given out at the office of State Auditor George W. Marsh Friday.

Beatrice, Neb., May 16.—(Special.)—G. A. Packard, a pioneer of Cortland, died Wednesday evening in a hospital at Lincoln, aged 73 years. He is survived by a widow and several children. Burial will be at Cortland.

Fremont Branch American Legion Attacks Slackers

Fremont, Neb., May 16.—(Special.)—In an advertisement in local papers the Dodge county branch, American Legion, attacked 10 wealthy Fremonters, nearly all retired farmers, for failure to subscribe to the Victory Loan. The acts of the non-subscribers who have been waited upon by the committee, are described in advertisements as "cowardly, unpatriotic and indefensible." Members of the legion, some of them returned overseas soldiers, called upon some of the group and insisted they take their quota. The 10 men are asked to pay up or get out of the community.

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Governor to Organize State Departments Under New Code Law

Lincoln, May 16.—In a conference with newspaper men in the executive office Friday, in answer to a question whether he expected to go ahead and organize the departments of the state under the new code law irrespective of the referendum action, Governor McKelvie said there was nothing else to do.

"The legislature directed that these departments should be organized and I have no right to anticipate the result of the referendum. I shall make my appointments of secretaries probably before I leave for New York next Monday. If the referendum petitions receive the required number of signatures, why of course the matter will stand as it was when the petitions were filed. If they do not receive the required number, then the completion of the organization can be made in time."

In answer to another question as to the sentiment as he found it out in the state regarding the code bill, the governor said that wherever he had spoken, as soon as the people came to know just what the code bill did and had the matter thoroughly explained, there appeared to be a unanimous sentiment that the new law should be tried out.

In his opinion the people have been misinformed regarding the code bill and have been prejudiced against it through misinformation given out by parties interested in killing the law.

Hyers Finds Whisky Hidden Under Body of Auto; Omaha Girl Held

Lincoln, May 16.—State Law Enforcement Officer Gus Hyers made another haul of contraband whisky in Lincoln Thursday, when he arrested Al Bush of Shenandoah, Ia., who had concealed under the body of his Buick automobile 59 pints of whisky.

Bush was accompanied by Miss Alma Simpson of Omaha, who said that she had been traveling with Bush from Council Bluffs to Sidney, Ia., and from there to Nebraska City and Lincoln.

Miss Simpson did not know that the booze was under the car, although she admitted that she thought something was wrong, because Bush drove so carefully.

At the time of the arrest, Bush was getting his car repaired. Miss Bush said that she did not know Bush was a married man or that he was said to have a wife and child in Shenandoah. She met him at the home of her sister in Council Bluffs.

Over 100 Losses From Hail Reported to State Board

Lincoln, May 16.—Over 100 hail losses were reported to the state hail insurance board today. About 75 per cent of these losses were from Phelps county, while the remainder came from Dawson and Butler.

The claims ran all the way from a total of about a half or quarter damage, most of them being about half total destruction.

Pay \$40 for Alfalfa Meal

Lincoln, May 16.—According to a voucher reaching the office of the state auditor, the state is paying \$40 a ton for alfalfa meal for the boys' industrial school at Kearney. The institution has purchased 15 tons from the Omaha Alfalfa Mill company.
