Tulsa Batters Gather Fourteen Hits and Haynes Holds Saints to Four Little Bingles.

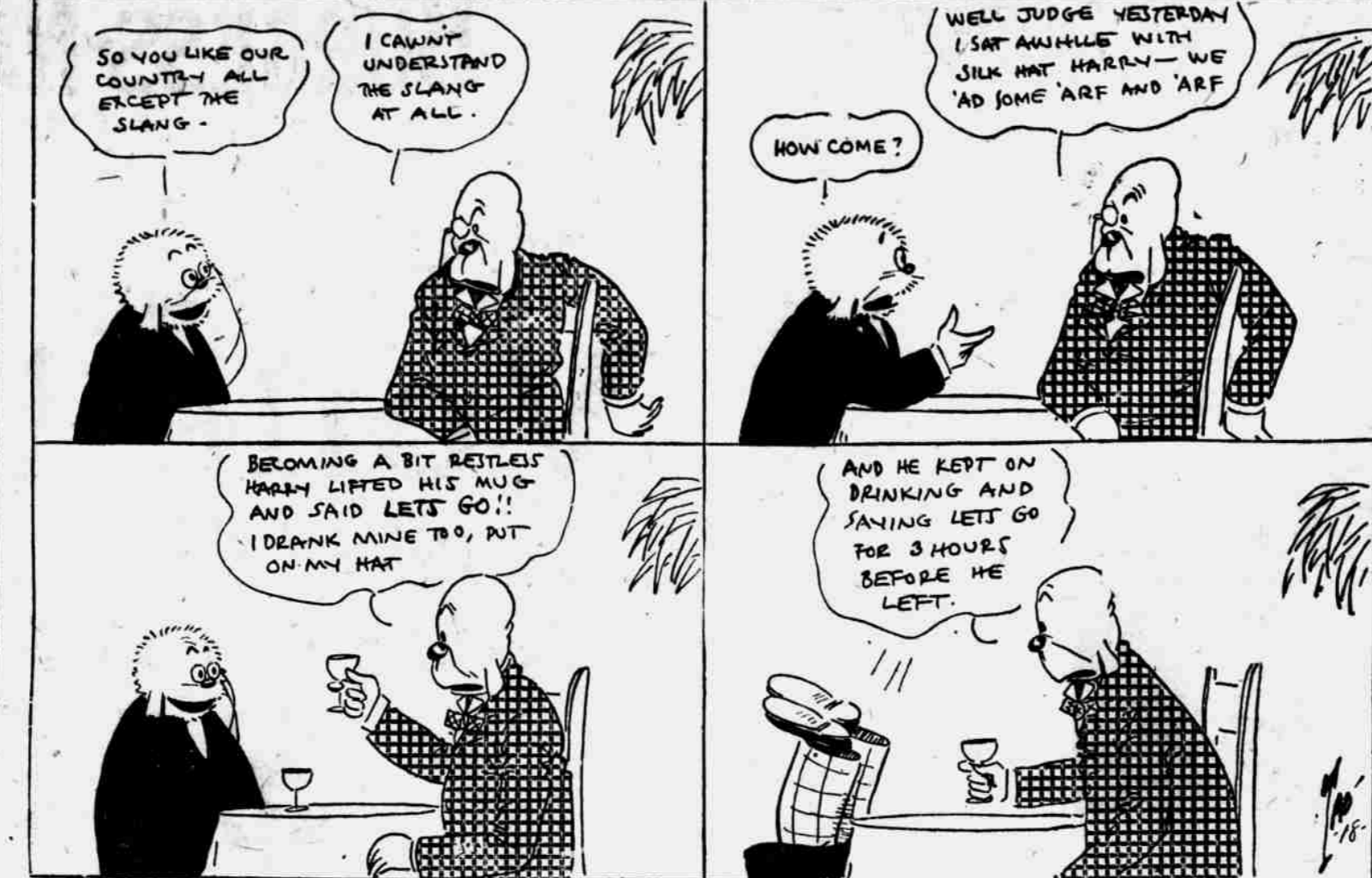
