

### PROGRESSIVES LOSE FIGHT ON SENATE HEADS

Senator Norris and Other Members of Opposition Refuse to Attend Party Conference.

Washington, May 26.—Republican senators of the progressive group lost their fight today against selection of Senators Penrose of Pennsylvania and Warren of Wyoming, as chairmen of the finance and appropriations committees, respectively, the party conference approving both assignments. Several progressive senators did not attend the meeting.

A motion by Senator Johnson of California to strike out Senator Penrose's name as chairman of the finance committee, was defeated, 35 to 5. Those supporting it were Senators Johnson, Cummins, Iowa; Kellogg, Minnesota; McCormick, Illinois; and McNary, Oregon. Senator Johnson indicated in an address to the conference that he would not carry his opposition to the senate floor.

Only One Roll Call. Action of the conference was announced by Senator Wadsworth of New York, secretary, who said there was no roll call on adoption of the committee assignments after the conference had approved the selection of Senator Penrose. Progressives who opposed Senators Penrose and Warren and who did not attend the conference were: Borah, Idaho; Kenyon, Iowa; and Norris, Nebraska. Other absentees were: La Follette, Wisconsin; Lenroot, Wisconsin; and Capper, Kansas.



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### Leaders of Labor, Education and Press to Speak at Omaha Meet of League for Peace

Labor, education and the press will be ably represented in the Omaha meeting of the League to Enforce Peace, which will be held Saturday afternoon and night at the Auditorium.

John H. Walker, retiring president of the Illinois State Federation of Labor, will speak on the league of nations from the viewpoint of labor.

Dr. William O. Thompson, president of the Ohio State university, will discuss the subject from the standpoint of the educator.

Hamilton Holt, editor of The Independent, New York, will approach the question with the point of view of the independent editor.

All three speakers are virile Americans, well qualified to speak on the league of nations and on the

desirability of a league to enforce peace.

Mr. Holt has recently returned from Paris, where he was one of the delegates from the League to Enforce Peace at a conference of organizations formed to promote the league of nations. He also represented the World Alliance for the Promotion of Friendly Relations Among the Church of the World at Paris.

Plan Larger Committee.  
The conference considered a plan for further increase of the relations committee so that more democrats might be retained, but left the question to a subcommittee composed of Senators Lodge and McCumber.

The democratic steering committee resumed its work of naming democratic members of the senate standing committees today and a conference of senate democrats was called for 5 o'clock this afternoon to consider the appointments.

House democrats today completed their assignments of members of the house committees, thus perfecting organization of committees which will begin consideration this week of much important legislation.

Allotments Will Be Paid Without Formal Signing of New Bill  
Washington, May 26.—Payments of past due and current allotments to families of soldiers and sailors and dependents of civil war veterans will be made by the war risk insurance bureau waiting for the formal signing of the urgent deficiency bill by President Wilson.

Authority to send the checks forward "without a moment's delay," was cabled to Secretary Glass by President Wilson after the president had been informed that the \$45,000,000 deficiency measure had been passed by congress. The bill is now on its way to Paris where it will be signed by the president.

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### THREE RESCUED FROM FLAMES AS FIRE TAKES HOME

Caretaker at Carter Lake Club Carries Wife and Two Children to Safety Early Monday.

Ernest Gitt, caretaker at the Carter Lake club, his wife and two children, suffered slight burns about their heads and bodies and experienced a narrow escape from death early yesterday morning, when fire of unknown origin destroyed their home on the club grounds.

The members of the family were asleep on the second floor of the two-story frame dwelling. The blaze originated in the rear on the first floor. The house was filled with smoke and the flames were leaping from the downstairs windows and doors, when one of the children was awakened by the stifling smoke and the roar of the flames, which had begun to burn on the upper floor.

The child called to its father, who was asleep in the adjoining room. Mrs. Gitt was overcome when her husband seized her in his arms and plunged through the flames to safety. The man returned and was burned about the face and hand, while rescuing the smaller of the children.

The members of the family had been on the ground only a few minutes before the building collapsed. The Council Bluffs fire department was called, but arrived on the scene after the structure was destroyed. The loss is estimated at \$2,000 and is covered by insurance.

Auto Driver Wrecks Car.  
Anderson, Ind., May 26.—Arthur Billiu wrecked his automobile to keep from running over a dog that crossed the street in front of his machine. Billiu was taken to a hospital suffering from serious injuries.
