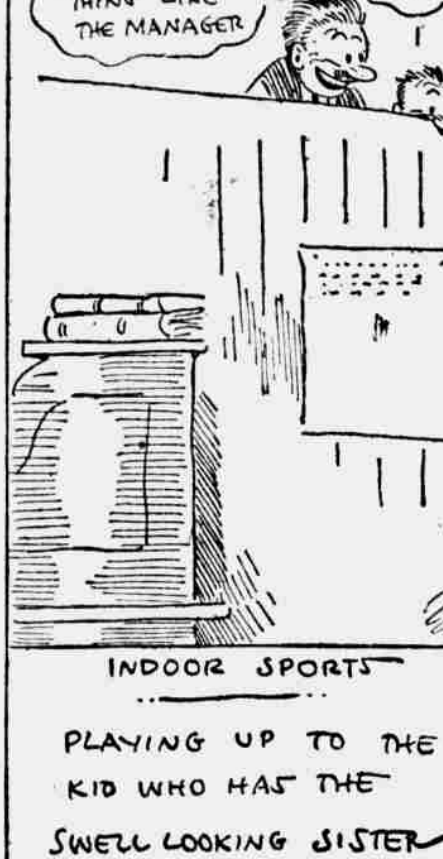
STAPLE LINE OF BAR-ROOM MIRROR ART. Steamboat coming around the bend. The bend is straightened out so that you can see the steamboat.
