EXPLOSION IN MINE KILLS 83; 50 INJURED. Broken Trolley Wire Sets Off Powder Kegs On Train on Which Men Were Riding to Work. Wilkesbarre, Pa., June 5.—Eighty-three men dead and 50 others burned and maimed, many of whom will die, is the toll of a disaster in the Baltimore Tunnel of the Delaware and Hudson Coal company in the east end section of this city early Thursday.
