Forty-one Students of the School of Commerce to Get Diplomas Friday.

Forty-one students of the High School of Commerce will be graduated from school Friday, June 13, at commencement exercises to be held in the Municipal Auditorium. Dr. Charles W. Flint of the Cornell college will deliver the commencement address. The girls outnumber the boys by only two, but of the 34 graduates who have completed the four-year course 18 are boys. The baccalaureate sermon will be preached Sunday morning at the First Presbyterian church by Rev. Edwin Hart Jenkins. Harry Latowsky is president of the four-year and three-year graduates. Miss Bernice Williams is vice-president; Norma Weeks, is secretary, and Frederick Hoffman, treasurer. 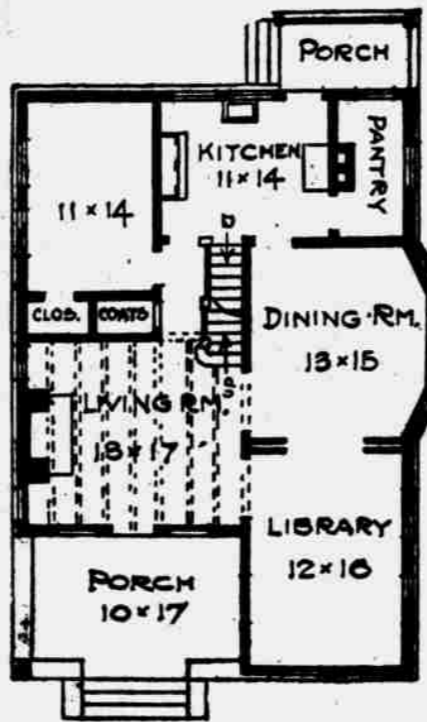
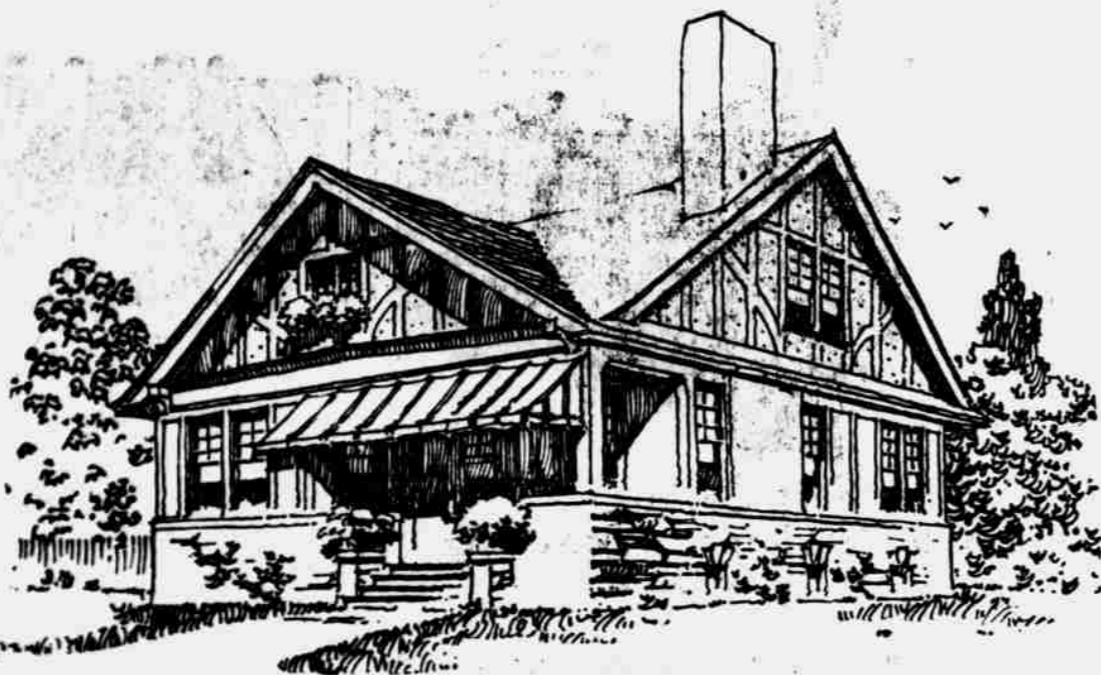

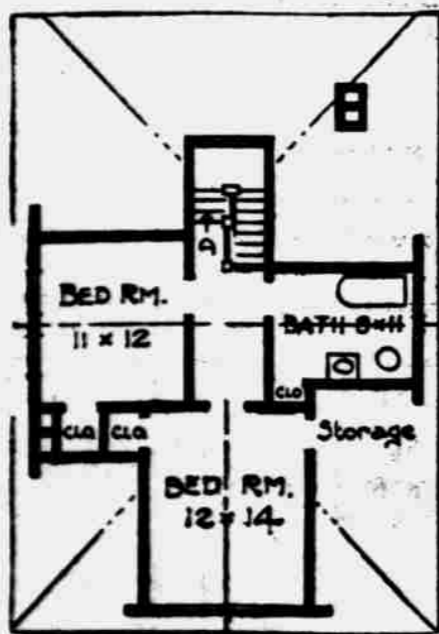
The High School of Commerce has continuous session all year, divided into four quarters of 12 weeks each. This is the third class to graduate under the quarterly system.

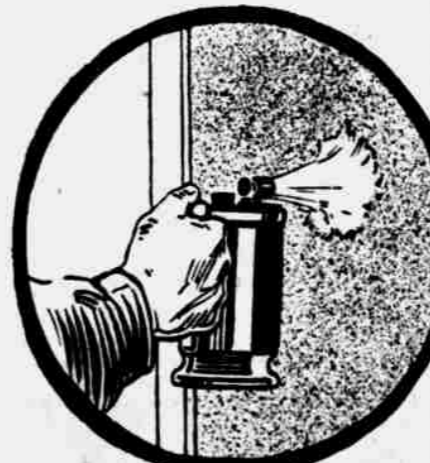
