Her soldier son, who threw the policeman out of his mother's bedroom, and was arrested for doing it, would have been within his legal and moral rights, this newspaper believes, if he had shot and killed the lawless assailants of his mother's privacy, modesty and honor.

If all the circumstances and charges the police allege were true, and proved to be true, the police action in this case would be no less outrageous. The police, no less than the humblest and meanest citizen, are subject to the government of law. The law provides a proper and adequate course of procedure for the punishment of such an offense as that alleged against Mrs. Brown. There is no color of law, no vestige of police power, to justify the entry, without legal warrant, of her home at night, her humiliating arrest and subsequent procedure. Police lawlessness is more odious and more dangerous than lawlessness in any other form. It is worse than mob law, for it makes the whole community, through its duly constituted officers, party to the crime. We mention the Brown instance prominently, but it is
