

# OMAHA INVENTED TRAFFIC SIGNAL NOW INSTALLED

Latest Achievement in Directing Traffic to Be Put into Operation This Morning.

This shows Traffic Officer John Kwasniewski, at Sixteenth and Harvey streets, in his new automatic signal tower which will be in operation this morning for the direction of traffic at this busy intersection. The model is the first to be erected on an Omaha street. It is a made-in-Omaha product, and is the invention of George C. Reilly, 839 South Twenty-fourth street, and Christian Reptaholt, South Side.



During the daytime, semaphore arms will indicate whether the trafficway is open for east and west travel, or for north and south movement. At nighttime the approaching drivers will be blocked by red lights or given clearance by green lights, as the case may be. Accompanying the movement of the semaphore arms or the light signals, there will be one sound of a gong for east and west clearance and two sounds for north and south.

## Federal Employment Bureau Here Will Be Continued 2 Months

The federal employment bureau in the basement of the court house will continue in operation, C. H. Davis, acting federal director for Nebraska, stated today. "The house passed the bill giving \$400,000 to keep the federal employ-

ment service in operation throughout the country for two months longer," he said. "The service would have had to be discontinued July 1 if this appropriation had not been made."

Curtailed of this employment service started March 22, 1919, when a number of offices were closed. The labor office at 1118 Farnam street and the branch office in the city hall, South Side, were abandoned because of lack of funds, as were also all branch offices through-

out the state. The Omaha office now has six employees.

The condition of the principal highways passing through Omaha were reported by the Omaha Automobile club as follows:  
Lincoln Highway, East—Rain to Glidden. Detour at Loveland is good.  
Lincoln Highway, West—Good to Kearney. Rough to North Platte.  
O. L. D., West—Rough for 72 miles this side of the Ashland bridge necessitating slow going. Bad detour this side of the bridge

Ashland to Lincoln is fair to good. West of Lincoln fair.  
White Pole, East—Fair to good. Dry.  
River to River, East—Fair to good. Dry.  
K. T., South—Rough for 12 miles this side of Plattsmouth. Plattsmouth to Nebraska City and Auburn is fair to good. Auburn south is rough for 12 miles.  
K. T., North—Fair to Missouri Valley. Some rough stretches north of Missouri Valley especially around Onawa and Salix. Dragging Wednesday.  
Military to Fremont—Bridge out west of Elk City. Take Lincoln Highway to Fremont.  
Black Hills Trail, north of Fremont—Very rough, and rutty. Take

Lincoln Highway to Columbus. Go north on Meridian road to Norfolk and points in that vicinity.  
Optional Route to Okoboji—River to River road to Minden. Pick up Omaha Cut Off (O. C. O. mark), five and one-half miles east of Omaha. Follow through Shelby, Harlan and Manning to Lincoln Highway. Double back three miles to west side and north to Wall Lake and Early to Storm Lake. Pick up Spirit Lake Airline from there to Okoboji and Spirit Lake.  
To Minneapolis—From Spirit Lake run east to Armstrong and north to Fairmont and Winnebago. Good Thunder to Mankato and Mankato to Fairbault. Go from Fairbault to Minneapolis on Jefferson Highway (J. H. mark.)

Lima, Peru, July 4.—A revolution broke out here at 3 o'clock this morning. President Pardo and the members of his cabinet were imprisoned.  
General A. A. Caceres, former president, was in charge of the revolutionary coup. Later in the morning he turned over control of affairs to Augusto B. Leguia, the president-elect. The revolutionary movement was accomplished without bloodshed.
