CONSIDER PLAN TO MAKE STREET 100 FEET WIDE

\$2,000,000 Project Presented to City Council Will Enlarge Twenty-fourth Street.

The city planning board and the city council are getting together in a serious manner for the consideration of the widening of Twenty-fourth street, Pacific to Cumming streets, to 100 feet. It is estimated that the project will cost \$2,000,000, part of which would be paid by special taxes spread over an assessment district, and part through the issuance of city bonds.
