Intent of Law Clear.

"If a dealer has a private car for himself and family, or has a separate truck, he would pay the same tax as any other individual or business man, and the purpose and intent of this law seems to be very clear.

"Section 19 states that each manufacturer or dealer doing business in United States and any government in Europe or in Asia. I suggest three lines of action by such mass meetings in each

First—The passage of resolutions of protest against any feature of the league of nations covenant which is in effect an offensive and defensive alliance between the government of the United States and the government of any nation in Europe or Asia, and the telegraphing of such resolutions to Senators Norris and Hitchcock. Should Name Delegates.

3. The delegation of one active citizen in each county to serve as county member of a provisional state committee to have charge of the work of organizing the state of Nebraska, and arousing the people to a sense of the great danger attending America and the American people in event that the British and Japanese interests shall by their powerful propagands persuade the United States senate to ratify those portions of the League of Nations; cevenant which constitute an offensive and defensive alliance between our own republic and any government in Europe or Asia.

I request that report of all county mass meetings together with names of state delegates and state committeemen, be mailed to me quickly. I will take care of the correspondence and all expense of it as long as my bank account will permit, and will then turn the work over to some proper person to be selected by the provisional state committee.

My final suggesstion to the friends of the cause is to hurry. Even now the senate of the United States is considering the proposed foreign alliance. Corn Averages 100 Per Cent Practically Throughout the State: Wheat 20 Bushels Per Acre.

Crop and soil conditions are exellent in Nebraska, according to the crop report of the Burlington for he week ending last Saturday Dealing with the corn crop, the re ort indicates that generally corn is good shape and that the growth is much farther advanced than usual at this season of the year. At no place in the state has corn been njured by dry weather.

Figuring on the basis of 100 per cent for the average condition at this season of the year, the estimate y divisiones, which include practically all the corn grown area of the state, follows:
