During a conversation Tuesday Colonel Chandler stated that government chemical experts have developed a helium gas, which is noninflamable and which will be used exclusively by the government in its dirigibles. He expressed the belief that such disasters as occurred in Chicago Monday will be avoided by

the use of helium gas.

The colonel was sanguine that transcontinental dirigible trips will be an everyday event before long. Great Training Station.

Fort Omaha already has been announced as the great central training station for balloonists of the army, and its additional importance as a dirigible station is believed to be the logical sequence of events. Unofficial tentative plans for the dirigible station at Fort Omaha indicate the erection of two large heds with a capacity of housing two dirigibles at the same time.


