



Military Prisoners at

Leavenworth Go to Work Leavenworth, Kan., July 28 .-

Ready, after nearly a week's con-finement in hot cells on a restricted diet, to submit to the orders of an armed guard composed of 1,300 troops, a part of the 2,500 prisoners at the military disciplinary barracks at Fort Leavenworth resumed work today without any demonstration such as precipitated the strike last Tuesday, according to Col. Sedgwick Rice, commandant of the prison.

Last Tuesday morning the men refused to leave their cells when ordered to work, representatives among the prisoners demanding better sanitary conditions, the right to submit to President Wilson a plea for amnesty and the return of two men transferred from the military barracks to another federal prison.

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
