PLANS PROBE OF ALLEGED TRUST OF PRODUCE MEN

Mayor Will Investigate Charges of Conspiracy by Commission Firms to Hold Up Prices.

Charges against the wholesale commission houses which supply Omaha with fruit and vegetables are made in a letter to Mayor Smith from a man who works for one of these houses and who says there is a deliberate conspiracy to keep down the supply and keep up the prices.

"I have seen, time and again, three or four wagonloads of fruit taken from a car on the tracks, the car then closed up and allowed to stand for several days, paying demurrage, and then when the car was opened half to two-thirds of the fruit was found to be spoiled.

"This is the reason why the people of Omaha are paying 60 cents a dozen for bananas, 5 cents each for pears and peaches, exorbitant prices for berries of all kinds and from \$1 up for watermelons.

"The proper steps to take would be for the federal grand jury to investigate the acts of commission houses in the interests of the people. There is plenty of fruit and this combine and conspiracy of the commission men to keep the prices up is a thing that the people should not stand for."

Admits 'Cheating' U. P. Out of \$4.83; Returns Money

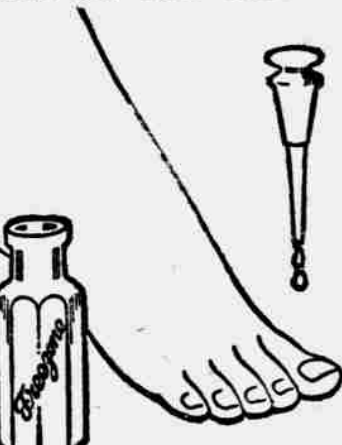
