

#### Called Unconstitutional.

"If, therefore, according to its proper construction," the opinion continues, "the act of congress of November 21 does not prohibit the manufacture and sale of non-intoxicating beer, the proposed enactment extending the prohibition to non-intoxicating liquors would, as to transactions prior to its passage, be in our opinion unconstitutional and void because violative of the letter and spirit of the mandate in Section 9. Article I of the constitution of the United States that no ex-post-facto law shall be passed by congress.

"The amendment in the house of section 1 of the Volstead bill by inserting the word 'hereafter' before the word 'construed' was probably for the purpose of avoiding this constitutional point; but it would permit one construction of the same term as to acts done prior to its passage and a different and broader construction as to acts done afterward. But the enactment tends to establish that the true intent was to enact practically new legislation beyond the scope of the existing ca actments."

Looting Breaks Out In London as Police Remain Out On Strike


