JO-JOS WIN TWO SUNDAY GAMES AT ROURKE PARK

Head of Increase Lead by Taking Both Ends of Double Bill With Rourke.

The visiting Jo-Jos walked off with two games yesterday afternoon, bouncing seven hits and four runs off Charlie Kopp in five and one-third innings, and nailing 'Lefty' Townsend for two more bingles during the rest of the first game, though the southpaw prevented them scoring.

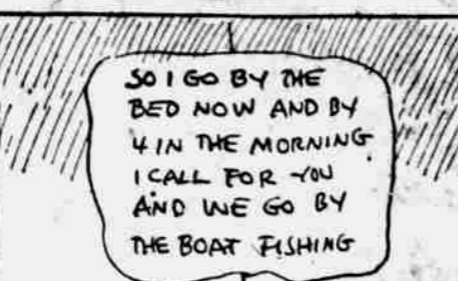

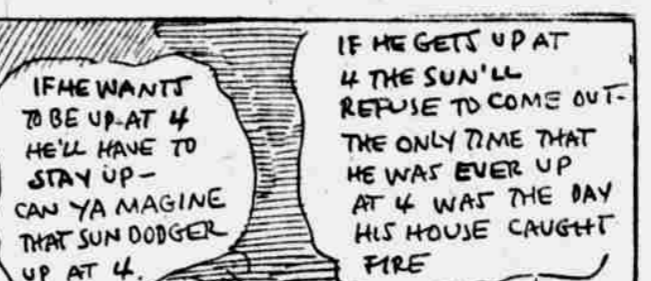
