Chicago, Sept. 9.—Surprise over the government estimate that the 1319 yield of corn would be 70.000,000 bushels more than was expected a month ago led to heavy selling today in the corn market. Prices closed unsettied, 1 to 13 c net lower, with Sentember \$1.61% and De-cember \$1.29% to \$1.29%. Oats finished Way off to %c advance, and provisions down 20c to \$1.00. Official forecast of a corn yield far in excess of the most optimistic guess by private obsorvers would alone have been sufficient to bring about a big rush to sell corn. In addition, however, the gov-ernment report showed a high condition for the crop. Besides, a nation-wide strike of stockvard and packing house employes was threatened, and there were reports that freight congression was ham-pering eastern ports. Bearish aspects of the world economic situation likewise at-tracted increasing notice. Before the ensuing break in corn prices could be stopped, a new low record for the same was reached in the May de-livery. 
