### INDIAN DAY TO **BE CELEBRATED** SEPTEMBER 26

Governor McKelvie Issues Proclamation to Do Honor to First Settlers for Part in War.

Lincoln, Sept. 18 .- (Special.)-Governor McKelvie issued a proclamation today, calling on the people of Nebraska, and particularly the schools, to celebrate Friday, September 26, as Indian day, in honor of the 3,500 original settlers still in Nebraska and of the 10,000 the United States, who joined the colors in the world war. Sixty Indian boys enlisted in the Fifth Nebraska regiment at the outset of the war.

The proclamation follows:

"Just how long the American Indian has been on this continent is difficult to determine. That he was here when Columbus discovered America is established by history, and antedates the landing of the Pilgrims by many moons.
