MEDICAL WOMEN WON'T APPROVE

Neither Will They Go on Record as Against the Insurance at Session Held in New York.

New York, Oct. 1.—California's 26 varieties of anti-medical people, according to Dr. Martha Welpton of Los Angeles, impelled her to protest so strongly against going on record for or against compulsory health insurance that the session of the International Conference of Women Physicians rejected the opportunity either to advocate or oppose the measure.

The motion to have the convention take a definite stand on compulsory health insurance followed an address on the subject by Dr. Alexander Lambert, president of the American Medical association and chief surgeon of the medical department of the American Red Cross, who spoke for an hour without declaring himself in favor or against it.
