

\$5,000 VOTED TO MRS. M'GOVERN BY THE HOUSE

Jefferis Puts Through Bill for Benefit of Widow of 'Omahan Killed by Army Truck.

Washington, Oct. 3.—(Special Telegram.)—The house Friday passed the bill authorizing the secretary of the treasury to pay Mrs. Thomas McGovern of Omaha \$5,000 for fatal injuries inflicted on her husband by a government motor truck driven by a regular enlisted soldier of the army.

Was Modest Sum. Mr. Jefferis said that the bill had been introduced in the house because it was the only available tribunal to which Mrs. McGovern could present her claim for the death of her husband, who was killed October 26, 1917, by the driver of an army car at Seventeenth and Cass streets, Omaha. He said he thought she was exceedingly modest in asking but \$5,000, for he felt sure that if she had been able to bring suit in the courts of Nebraska she could have recovered from \$10,000 to \$20,000.

Tribute to McGovern. Congressman Jefferis paid a fine tribute to the late Thomas McGovern, stating that he had made a splendid city commissioner and was actuated by high motives in the discharge of his duties.

The Omaha legislator had the help of Representatives Evans, Andrews and Kinkaid of Nebraska in getting the bill through, which brought him warm congratulations from many colleagues.

Dishop Shaler Makes His First Visit to Fremont

Fremont, Neb., Oct. 3.—(Special.)—The Rt. Rev. E. C. Shayer of Omaha, new bishop of the Nebraska diocese of the Episcopal church, made his first official visit to Fremont last evening and addressed a meeting at St. James church. Moros Disheartened When "Impregnable" Fort Is Taken By Pershing's Troopers

Maxim Guns and Mortar Rake Stronghold, and Hostiles Who Are Unable to Escape in Darkness Surrender the Next Morning—Ambush Staged by Savages on Lopely Trail Results Disastrously for Them—Pershing Reports Expedition Had Salutary Effect.

"Moros Disheartened." (Pershing's Report Continued.) "The command remained in camp at Bacolod during the night of the ninth, and preparations were made the next morning for moving toward Calahui, some three miles farther to the northeast. The sick and wounded and one of the mortars, under escort of Troop A, 15th cavalry, were sent back to Camp Vicars, and the command started for Calahui, keeping well up in the hills. "At a distance of 2,000 yards the fort came in view with its war flags flying and its Moro crises and campfires flashing in the sunlight. **Good Mortar Position.** "This point was a good mortar position, and mortar fire was open-

ed. The rest of the column pushed forward as rapidly as possible toward a position above Calahui that appeared favorable for the Maxims and the infantry. On account of the lack of trails and the roughness of the country it was 4 o'clock in the afternoon when the two leading companies of infantry and the Maxim guns reached the point selected. Here the Moros began firing upon us with great vigor, but the command we had of the position was such that the interior of their fort could be raked with artillery, and it was soon evident that they not only could do but little, but that they could not remain long in the fort without great loss.

Moros Flee in Dark. The fort was located on a point about 100 feet high that projects into the lake and was surrounded on three sides by water, the shores for some distance on both sides being covered with timber, placing Company C across the ridge, supporting the mountain guns at a range of 700 yards. Lieutenant Gracie with Company M was ordered toward the fort, to move with his left flank touching the lake. He encountered some resistance in the heavy timber, but soon reached the vicinity of the fort and made a thorough reconnaissance of it. Returning after dark he reported that many of the Moros had escaped by vinta, as many vintas were seen by him skirting the shore out of sight of our position. Upon the return about dark with the mortar Captain Gracie reported having seen Moros escaping. It was impossible to surround this fort, a firing line

was held intact during the night, and strong outposts were posted about camp, which was established on the ridge. **Moros Surrender.** "Little firing was done during the night and early next morning several Calahui Moros, under Datto Ampuan, came into camp and surrendered themselves, saying that all Moros had left the fort during the previous afternoon and night. In company with these Moros the fort was entered and afterwards destroyed. The Calahui Moros were required to take the oath of allegiance which they did according to Moro custom, and were released. They reported that the fort was occupied the day before by about 250 Moros of Calahui and Taraca, 23 of whom were killed and several wounded. We had no casualties. Five cannon and anticas were found inside the fort and destroyed.

New Attack Made. About 4 o'clock in the afternoon a messenger came in from Lieutenant Lear, stating that the advance guard of Troop A had been attacked by Bacolod Moros in the ravine just west of Bacolod ridge. Medical assistance was at once sent him, and the troop with the wounded reached camp at dark. Lieutenant Lear then reported that four Moros, armed with campilans had sprung from behind some large boulders, each one attacking a member of the point of the advance guard including Lieutenant Mangun. The four Moros were killed, but the four members of the advance guard were more or less severely wounded, of whom Corp. Claude D. Reade died shortly after reaching camp.

Moros Disheartened. "The Moros of Bacolod, however, had openly defied our authority for a year, and were supported by many who, while not openly hostile, were in sympathy with them. The destruction of their fort, thought by most Moros to be impregnable, and their losses in the battle destroyed their prestige forever, and will have a salutary and a lasting effect upon them and upon all the Moros in the Laguna. This effect will be strengthened by the fact that no property of any kind was destroyed except unavoidably, and that all Moros who expressed friendship were treated kindly. **Sent on New Expedition.** The success of this third expedition established the supremacy of the United States in Mindanao. There still remained one more task, however, before the Lake Lanao Moros were completely subjugated—an expedition around the lake. Spain, through all the centuries of her sovereignty over the Philippines, had vainly striven to make such an expedition. Always her soldier hosts were repulsed. No white man, nor no company of white men, in-

deed, had ever accomplished the circuit of the lake. (Continued Tomorrow)
