

GAPS CAUSED BY HAMILTON DEATH NOT YET FILLED

Successors Will Be Hard to Select, Say Officials of Organizations Affected—Will Act Deliberately.

The death of Frank T. Hamilton, Omaha capitalist, has left a gap in the official personnel of three large Omaha business institutions which will be hard to fill, according to his closest business associates.

Will Not Act Hastily.

Mr. W. W. Wattle, chairman of the board of directors of the street car company, stated yesterday that a meeting of the board of directors would be held next Tuesday.

"Although we may take up the problem of choosing a new president at the board meeting," said Mr. Wattle, "it is not likely that we will make a decision at that meeting. It is one of the most important matters that has been brought before the company for a long time and we will not act hastily."

May Be Outside Man.

An official of the Chamber of Commerce Wednesday, declared that in all probability no Omaha man would be chosen as president.

Men who are in close touch with the affairs of the company predict that Mr. Wattle will again take charge of the company, as president. Others declare that Mr. Wattle's duties as chairman of the board of directors of the United States National bank will make it impossible for him to become president of the traction company.

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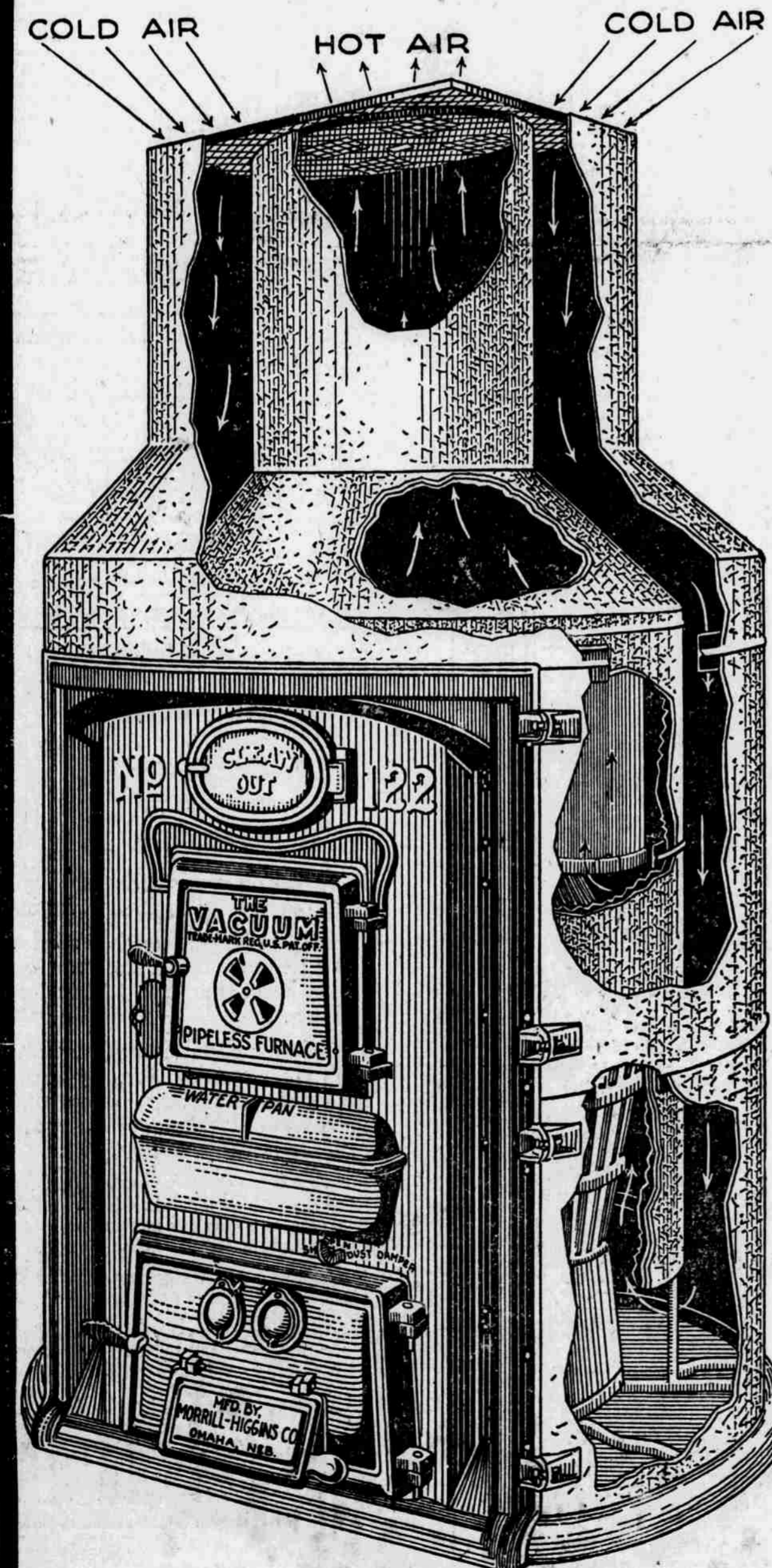
