New Relationship Dawns. "For 18 years Creighton men have longed to see their teams in action against the State university," said Burkley. "A certain ill-feeling had risen between the two schools in some manner and that feeling seemed to keep these two teams apart. Today Creighton faces the dawn of a new relationship with the

Cornhusker school.
"On Saturday both teams will battle for the honors of their school and their state on the same gridiron. Saturday evening both teams will feast together as the guests of the Omaha Athletic club. After dinner they will attend a theater party as guests of the Omaha Chamber of Commerce. That means to me and a host of other Creighton alumni that the old feud existing formerly between these two insti-tutions has been broken and I ex-pect to see soon the Red and White of the State university elegen arrayed in combat against the Blue and White of Creighton in an annual contest."

To Enclose Bowl.

"Plans have been begun by the alumni of Creighton to enclose the present campus with a monster con-crete bowl, the finest in the middle west. That, too, means greater fields in athletics for Creighton."

Fred Armstrong, a senior in the medical department at Creighton, led the rally in cheers. Under Armstrong's direction the Creighton fans

learned the yells and new songs in preparation for Saturday's game. Torchlight Parade.

A torchlight parade, starting at Creighton law school at 7:30 tonight, will include every Creighton student. Torches will be carried by the students and the Creighton band, augmented, will lead the procession. The entire seat section on the west
