BOOSTERS RALLY; CREIGHTON HOPES TO MEET HUSKERS

Burkley Voices Hope That New Relationship Between Schools Will Result in Annual Game.

While nearly 400 rapid Creighton students yelled themselves weak at a booster rally in Creighton gymnasium last night, Coach Tommy Mills took the Blue and White foot ball team through a lengthy "chalk talk" in a classroom in the high school department a block away.

When Harry V. Burkley, alumnus of Creighton, pointed to the new relationship springing up between the University of Nebraska and Creighton and declared he saw in it a ray of hope that his alma mater and the Cornhuskers would soon tangle on the gridiron, the cheering of the "boosters" reached the ears of the Creighton team, locked in the classroom for the "chalk talk."

New Relationship Dawns. "For 18 years Creighton men have longed to see their teams in action against the State university," said Burkley. "A certain ill-feeling had risen between the two schools in some manner and that feeling seemed to keep these two teams apart. Today Creighton face the dawn of a new relationship with the Cornhusker school."

"On Saturday both teams will battle for the honors of their school and their state on the same gridiron. Saturday evening both teams will feast together as the guests of the Omaha Athletic club. After dinner they will attend a theater party as guests of the Omaha Chamber of Commerce. That means to me and a host of other Creighton alumni that the old feud existing formerly between these two institutions has been broken and I expect to see soon the Red and White of the State university eleven arrayed in combat against the Blue and White of Creighton in an annual contest."

To Enclose Bowl. "Plans have been begun by the alumni of Creighton to enclose the present campus with a monster concrete bowl, the finest in the middle west. That, too, means greater fields in athletics for Creighton."

Fred Armstrong, a senior in the medical department at Creighton, led the rally in cheers. Under Armstrong's direction the Creighton fans learned the yells and new songs in preparation for Saturday's game.

Torchlight Parade. A torchlight parade, starting at Creighton law school at 7:30 tonight, will include every Creighton student. Torches will be carried by the students and the Creighton band, augmented, will lead the procession.

The entire seat section on the west side of the field and north of the 50-yard line has been reserved for Creighton students. Eight cheer leaders met last night after the rally and practiced leading their respective contingents.

Banners are being made to designate the different departments in the parade tonight and at the game tomorrow.

Huskers in Final Open Field Workout Before Oklahoma Mix

Lincoln, Neb., Oct. 23.—(Special Telegram).—A two-hour drill in open field formations, anticipating the forward pass excellence of the Oklahoma foot ball team, characterized the final practice of the Nebraska Cornhuskers at Nebraska field this afternoon. The Husker squad leaves for Omaha tomorrow afternoon at 1:30 o'clock.

Coach Schulte definitely announced that Dale, fullback; Munn, guard, and Wilder, tackle, will not enter the game. The deduction of these three cuts the Husker weight averages to considerably less than the Oklahoma eleven. Schulte is figuring on beating Bender at his own game. McGlasson, it was announced, would start at quarter with Howarth, veteran pilot, in the halfback column. Wright, the flashy back who scored against Notre Dame, is now regularly entrenched in the fullback position. The Nebraska squad will turn out late Friday for a workout at Creighton field.

Mexican Congress Seeks to Limit Power Of President Carranza

Washington, Oct. 23.—The Mexican House of Deputies has voted general approval of a proposal to withdraw extraordinary powers granted to President Carranza two years ago, under which he decreed many laws, according to advices today from Mexico City, but when efforts were made to confirm the action in detail the government minority left the chamber in a body. This was repeated three times in a single session, and lack of a quorum prevented final action.

South Side Grid Team Preparing for Hard Game at Lincoln

The South Omaha Packers, who held University Place to a 6 to 6 tie last week, are gradually getting into excellent shape for the Lincoln High school battle, which will be staged at Lincoln Friday afternoon.

The Packers' team probably will never again buckle up against such a team that they will meet Friday, as the state capital lads are considered one of the best foot ball teams in Nebraska.

The South team is going through strenuous practice with the second squad and special signal drill every evening at the school. This game will decide whether Coach Patton's warriors will be able to finish the season as a candidate for the state honors. If Lincoln should defeat the local lads they will not be able to qualify for the state championships, as they have lost three games this season.

Coach Patton is depending upon Tommy Ferris to win Friday's game, as he is a veteran and is well drilled on the signals and the art of playing foot ball. He has been the star in every game South High has played.

The men will be drilled hard and long on both straight foot ball and open formation for the Friday game. About 100 students will probably leave with the foot ball men.
