GEN. YUDENITCH FORCED TO MOVE BACK HIS ARMY

Chance of Taking Petrograd Before Winter Fading-Kresnoye Selo Recaptured by Reds.

London. Oct. 27.—The chances of General Yudenitch, commander of the Russian northwestern army, to capture Petrograd before winter puts and end to operations, seem have brought strong reinforcements rom other fronts and have started a successful counter-offensive which has already resulted in the recapture of Kresnoye Selo and thrusting the Yuenitch line south of that

Yndenitch still holds Gatchina firmly, according to the British war office review of the situation up to

Sunday evening.

The bolshevily reinforcements include some of the best communists They have forced back Yudenitch's trops at several points, and the latter were obliged to evacuate Tsarskoe Selo and Pavlovsk Saturday.

Recapture Krasnoye Selo.

By another strong attack Sunday. bolsheviki recaptured Krasnoye , the Yudenitch forces falling back to a general line two miles south of Ropcha, four miles south of Krasnove Selo and Vladimirskaya, and six miles east of Gatchina. This line covering Gatchina has been successfuly held against furious bolshevik attacks, which now are reported to have ceased.

According to a government state-Britain is no longer supplying fundor supplies to Admiral Kolchak and not contemplate supplying General Denikine indefinitely.
