

# EGGS. BUTTER ON STEADY CLIMB ON OMAHA MARKET

Prices Show Advance for Fifth Consecutive Week—Many New Fruit and Vegetable Arrivals.

For the fifth consecutive week the price on both butter and eggs has gone up 2 cents. Butter is retailing on the local market between 64 and 73 cents a pound, the best packing creamery butter selling to 73 and the tub butter from 64 cents up.

Eggs are selling for 52, 55 and 64 cents a dozen. Market prices remain the same and many new arrivals in fruits and vegetables are being received from the southern and California growers. Some of the fruits are California peeled peaches at 35 cents a pound, seedless raisins, 25 cents a pound, and stewed figs, 30 cents a pound.

**Southern Vegetables Arrive.** Southern vegetables are arriving on the market every day. Some of the vegetables already here are challofs, carrots, beets, endive, parsley, escarol and mustard.

Radishes are not expected to reach here for two or three weeks yet. Ripe tomatoes from California are selling for 20 cents a pound.

Apples are exceptionally high, the best delicious apples selling for \$5 a box. Balfour eating apples retail for \$2.40 a box. Cooking apples bring 85 cents a peck.

**Make Their Own Bread.** "Housewives are getting back to the old habit of making their own bread," says Al King, manager of the grocery department of Hayden Bros. store. "We have sold more flour this month than any three months before, and I believe the women will save considerable by baking their own bread."

"Not only in bread baking, but in other things as well, are the food buyers of the house showing that they are making an effort to defeat the high cost of living by doing more things themselves in the cooking line instead of buying it already prepared."

# New Home and Love Needed By Boy—Old Offenders Are Given More Consideration

By what queer mental twists are our judges and jurors passing sentences these days?

Byron Michaels, 12-year-old Beatrice, Neb., boy has been sentenced to nine years in the reform school for stealing books which he took to quiet corners to read—a sign of intelligence which many good parents would be glad to see in their own sons. Byron threw these out of the library window, two or three at a time, until the number reached 59—and the judge has darkened the rest of his young life in the reform school, a boy's prison.

But this was Byron's second offense. Once before he took silver from some good citizen's home—and so he must be gotten rid of. A menace to the community. His second offense could not be forgiven for, indeed the judges of today are not the Christ of yesterday.

We are moved to wonder what kind of treatment, environment and training Byron had between his two deeds of misconduct? Was the judge a man who believed more in punishment than in guidance? Or did he know only too well what kind of a life the child would be sent back to, and decided on the reform school as the better of two evils?

Can our mother hearts be silent? Can our mother instincts lie dormant while they see the spirit of a little boy, an inveterate reader thirsting perhaps for better things, crushed and warped?

Our court records show that the vilest fiends are sometimes sentenced to from 30 to 60 days for attempted assault; for forging large checks men often get a parole.

Women (with influence) walk into stores and steal thousand-dollar fur coats, "lift" whatever their fancy happens to light upon, and are given reprimands; when a banker robs his depositors he is often given new trials, many of them, and paroled. But this child of small-town streets is given nine years at the reform school—the best nine years of his life.

Did the boy want education? Perhaps he needs love and sympathy. We are sure he needs new environment. Or has Jean Val Jean and his judges come back to earth?

Wonderful mothers, who have reared geniuses and statesmen, have confessed the trials they experienced while teaching, training and loving away tendencies to be dishonest. Are Byron's parents incapable of this great task? Could it be possible that these poor parents were given a son who, through dishonesty, would be forced to leave them to enter the home of superior foster parents, who would give him the care and training and, most of all, example, that he needs? "God moves in a mysterious way his wonders to perform"—and Byron's sentence may be the open door through which he climbs to splendid manhood, by the guidance and love of foster parents who will give him education, a new home and a fair chance. Does Omaha hold within its heart, such a couple?

The Bee yesterday informed us that a pardon could be secured for Byron provided a suitable home was found for the erring boy.
