

JUDGE ORDERS DISCHARGE OF FOUR SUSPECTS

Two Negroes Fined On Vagrancy Charge and Two Others Are Discharged by Foster.

Four negroes who were arrested Thursday night for investigation in connection with the attack on Miss Zeta Monahan, 3010 Davenport street, Wednesday night were released from jail yesterday upon order of Judge Foster, sitting in central police court.

Two of the men, Hugh Hall and Vernon Pearl, both of Council Bluffs, were fined \$12.50 and costs for vagrancy. The others, Elwood Carter, Thirtieth and Cass streets, and Mack Johnson, Council Bluffs, were discharged. Hall was carrying a revolver when arrested.

Miss Monahan did not go to central police station to attempt to identify any one of the four negroes as her assailant. Police did not notify her, it was learned.

Two other negroes, Ralph Underwood, 2708 Seward street, and Howard Birge, Twenty-sixth and Parker streets, are still being held by police following a statement by Miss Monahan that "they looked like the man who followed me."

Twenty One Alleged Vagrants File Past Police Court Judge

Twenty-one alleged vagrants, eight of them negroes, received fines, jail sentences or were discharged in central police court yesterday. They were arrested Thursday. Many of them gave out-of-town addresses. Two of the men were professed I. W. W.s, and are being held pending an investigation by federal authorities.

William Gethner, who gave his address as Ashona, Conn., and Fred Miller, Sioux City, Ia., were each given 15 days in jail for vagrancy. Gethner was arrested when he is said to have shouted in German to Policeman O. P. Peterson when the officer questioned him Thursday at Thirtieth and Douglas streets. Among his effects Gethner had an insurance policy made out in German. He said he had relatives who fought in Germany.

Pete Wegworth alias "Frisco Pete," notorious police character, was also arrested and booked for vagrancy and investigation. Police say Wegworth is wanted in connection with certain prominent burglaries committed during the last week.

Ask \$150,000 Damage For Alleged Alcohol Sales Crippling Man

Damage suits aggregating \$150,000 were filed in district court yesterday in amended petitions by Mrs. Bridget Morrissey and her son, George Morrissey, against Morris Milder, Harry Milder and James Christopher.

It is alleged the defendants, through drug stores and saloons, owned by them sold alcohol to George Morrissey, which wrecked him physically.

It is charged that Morrissey was sold raw alcohol at the Paxton pharmacy, February 14, and after drinking it, he lost his way walking home and lay down at Thirtieth and Wirt streets, where he was found so badly frozen that he has lost all the fingers and toes and his heels. He is unable to stand and will never be able to work again, it is alleged. Mrs. Morrissey is 75 years old. She asks \$50,000 damages. George Morrissey asks for \$100,000 damages.

The condition of Marie Scanlon, 40 years old, 617 South Eighteenth street, injured in a street car accident Thursday night, is still critical, attendants at the Lord Lister hospital say.

The woman suffered a fractured collarbone, a fracture of the frontal bone of the skull, and many body bruises when she was struck by an east-bound street car at Eighteenth and Leavenworth streets. She was dragged 30 feet after she was hit, and H. Doud, 3102 Decatur street, who was operating the car, said slippery rails was the reason he was unable to stop quickly.

Chicago Aldermen Inspecting Plans For Omaha Zoning

W. R. O'Toole and George Pretzel, Chicago aldermen, are in Omaha to obtain information which may serve them in the proposed zoning of the big city by the lake. They are on a tour of cities. "The Illinois state legislature authorized Chicago to adopt a general zoning plan and it is our purpose to avoid the mistakes made by other cities," said Mr. O'Toole.

An ordinance embodying the local zoning plan will be prepared soon for introduction to the city council.

Drives Negroes Out of Corbin. Corbin, Ky., Oct. 31.—Angered by a series of attacks on white men, a mob here last night placed more than 200 negroes on departing trains and forced most of the remaining negroes to leave on foot. One negro was killed, according to reports, and two others wounded. The town is quiet today.
