COAL SITUATION CRITICAL HERE, REPORTS STATE

Acting Governor Issues Statement Explaining the Power of Nebraska Authorities.

Lincoln, Nov. 5.—(Special.)—The coal situation is becoming so acute in some sections of the state that the governor's office and the office of the State Railway commission is besieged with letters and telegrams asking that something be done to help them get coal. It is a matter that can only be handled by the government through its fuel agencies and the railroads. In an effort to give the public the true condition Acting Governor Barrows issued the following to the newspapers, hoping that it would give the people an understanding of the matter:

"Communications are being received every day regarding the shortage of coal in many towns of the state. This matter is being handled in a way, which, it is hoped, will bring about the results needed. In order to facilitate the work and prevent duplication of correspondence, the State Railway commission is handling the matter regarding coal shortage, as it is purely within their jurisdiction and they are fully acquainted with the situation all over the state. Wherever there is a shortage of coal, it would be well to take the matter up with the local agent of the railroad in the town where the shortage exists. He will be expected to take the matter up with the proper railroad authorities higher up.

Nonpartisan League Gets Snowed Under in Election

Many Members of Legislature and Other Prominent Nebraskans Chosen to Revise State Constitution—Conservatives Will Hold Power.

Lincoln, Nov. 5.—(Special.)—The result of the election to select delegates to the constitutional convention which will meet in Lincoln December 2 is very satisfactory to those who believe that the people of Nebraska should be allowed to select men to make a state constitution who live in Nebraska and that the domination of outsiders should not prevail.

Of the 100 delegates selected, returns show that 73 are known to be opposed to outside influences, 10 had the support of the Nonpartisan league and 8 were placed on the "unknown" list.

The list appears to be composed of men who ought to be able to give the state a good constitution, and many of them are men with previous legislative or state office experience. In Lancaster county but one of the Nonpartisan league candidates was able to pull through, C. C. Flansburg, who besides getting a big vote in the county precincts, also got a good vote in the city.

Many Experienced Men. Among those elected are found the names of former Speaker Jackson of Nelson, L. A. Varner of Sterling, E. M. Pollard of Nehawka, C. L. Saunders, Jerry Howard and C. W. Sears of Omaha, Frantz C. Radke of Harrington, J. H. Reinenrath of Crofton, I. L. Albert of Columbus, C. P. Peterson, W. A. Sellick of Lincoln, John Heasty of Fairbury,

about a better condition along this line, and they believe that if coal can be secured, they will be able to do so. The matter of what is considered an emergency is where there may be no coal in less than two weeks. The people of the state should stand together in this proposition and do all that they can to save what fuel we have on hand. We do not know what the next two weeks will bring forth, but we should keep both feet on the ground and look upon the matter in an optimistic light as possible."

DEPARTMENT OF WAR REFUSES TO GIVE UP TRUCKS

Nebraska Congressman Explains Legislation Authorizing Transfer of Cars to Build Roads.

Washington, Nov. 5.—(Special Telegram.)—Congressman Reavis, replying to a question of a Virginia member with reference to the bill reported out of the military affairs committee of the house concerning the distribution of motor vehicles to the highway departments of the several states, said that the legislation was absolutely unnecessary.

At some length Mr. Reavis traced the legislation vesting in the War department the authority to turn over to the Highway department all the surplus motor vehicles for the purpose of being operated upon the roads which are being built in whole or in part by federal aid.

He said that notwithstanding an opinion by the attorney general that subsequent legislation enacted by congress affecting these motor vehicles did not change the original intent of congress, the secretary of war persisted in refusing to turn the surplus machines over to the Agricultural department.

A resolution coming from the special committee on war expenditures, Mr. Reavis said, would be brought up concerning surplus trucks and automobiles, and directing the secretary of war to carry out the law as originally passed.

"You cannot pass it any too quickly for me," said Representative Harrison of Virginia, whose question brought out the above facts.
