GOV. M'KELVIE IS NOT CALLED UPON FOR VOLUNTEERS

Other States Fail to Take Advantage of His Offer To Send Mine Workers.

Lincoln, Neb., Dec. 3.—Although no governor of any nearby coal producing state has as yet accepted the offer made Tuesday by Gov. Samuel R. McKelvie to send volunteer workmen from this state into the coal fields to mine coal, plans for enrolling men for this work were going forward yesterday, it was announced at the governor's office.

The governor said the volunteers called for by him in an official proclamation Tuesday would be ready for duty in case his offer is accepted, and announced a committee would be named to assist in the work of enrolling them. Already about 600 state university students

have pledged themselves to serve as miners if necessary. Answering the governor's offer, Gov. R. D. Carey of Wyoming said he would seek assistance from Nebraska volunteers if such a plan became necessary, while Gov. W. L. Harding of Iowa expressed the opinion unskilled labor could not be used in the Iowa fields. Gov. F. D. Gardner of Missouri, responding to an appeal by Governor McKelvie for coal for this state, wired that he was doing everything "possible" and that he hoped for "substantial progress within 24 hours." Governor Gardner has neither accepted nor rejected the offer of volunteers.

Volunteers are required to enlist at county clerks' offices. Their names will be registered by the governor's committee, headquarters for which will be established at the office of the state's adjutant general, one of the commitments. The governor planned to go to Colorado Wednesday to discuss the fuel situation with officials of that state and later expects to leave for the east on a similar mission.

Captain Adams Wants to Raise Volunteers to Mine Coal

Capt. C. E. Adams, post commander-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, thinks action is needed to relieve the coal situation. He therefore offers the governor his services in the way of raising and leading an organization of volunteers to the mines. He has notified the mayor of his having sent the following telegram to Governor McKelvie:

"This fuel crisis is undoubtedly a conspiracy intended not only to bring ruin to our homes, but to defy and disrupt our government. This condition calls for united action. The suffering of our people is already alarming, the patriotism of our country is aroused and if organized they will speedily overcome this dire condition. Sinking all desire for preferment and with your approval I will attempt to raise 1,000 men to mine coal in territory adjacent to Nebraska, and if food, shelter and arms are furnished and it becomes necessary we will protect ourselves while at the mines."

More Time Granted to Committee on Rules

Lincoln, Neb., Dec. 3.—(Special.)—The morning session of the today constitutional convention here today was occupied with the report of Charles W. Sears, chairman of the committee on rules. In his report, Mr. Sears asked for more time, which was granted.

Dodge County Agent Will Run Model Farm at Seward

Fremont, Neb., Dec. 3.—(Special.)—L. C. Christie, county agent for Dodge county for the last two years has resigned and will go to Seward county to take up similar work. Mr. Christie has leased a farm of 52 acres near Seward, which he will operate along lines he advocates in his work. He will keep a small dairy herd, a flock of poultry and a few pigs.

Farmhouse Near Ashland Is Destroyed by Fire

Ashland, Neb., Dec. 3.—(Special.)—Fire destroyed the farm house of James B. Ballou, five miles northwest of Ashland. Mr. Ballou built a fire in the kitchen stove and went into another room, closing the door. In a few minutes the kitchen was afire and the flames spread rapidly, leaving time to save little of the contents except the piano. Loss, about \$1,500 on house and contents, is covered by insurance.

Judge Perry Resigns From Fourteenth District Bench

Lincoln, Neb., Dec. 3.—(Special.)—Judge E. B. Perry of the 14th Nebraska district has resigned, according to reports from Governor McKelvie's office here. Representative J. E. Fultz is mentioned here as a possible candidate to fill the vacancy.

Beatrice Youth Wounded By Brother on Hunting Trip

Beatrice, Neb., Dec. 3.—(Special.)—John Buchholz, 17 years old, was slightly wounded in the face and neck yesterday by his brother, Joe, who was shooting rabbits. A number of birdshot pierced his face and neck and they were later removed by a physician. His injuries are not serious.

Celebrate Golden Wedding

Beatrice, Neb., Dec. 3.—(Special.)—Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Seitz, pioneer residents of Gage county, celebrated their golden wedding anniversary at their home in this city in the presence of about 100 friends.

Hold Poultry Show

Beatrice, Neb., Dec. 3.—(Special.)—The annual exhibition of the Wyomere Poultry association is being held this week. Earl Smiley of Beaver Crossing is acting as judge. Several hundred fine birds are on exhibition.

Well Known Editor and Author Dies in Chicago

Chicago, Dec. 3.—T. Z. Cowles, editor and author, died Wednesday night of pneumonia, aged 74 years. For 20 years, until he retired about a year ago, Mr. Cowles was editor of the Economist of New York, and previously had been managing editor of the St. Paul Pioneer-Press and sporting editor, musical and dramatic critic and night editor of the Chicago Tribune. He served in a Minnesota regiment in the civil war.

CHIEF SAYS HE'S PROUD OF RECORD OF POLICE FORCE

But Wave of Crime Continues and Crooks Keep on Terrorizing City While He Talks.

The wave of crime in Omaha continues, with police apparently powerless to check it. There have been approximately 50 robberies and other crimes reported since November 18, with few, if any, arrests made. Despite this fact, and in the face of another black record against the police Tuesday night, Chief of Police Eberstein called reporters into his office and declared he was proud of the record of the Omaha police.

Use Fake Warrant

Two unidentified men, with a fake search warrant, forced their entrance into the home of D. B. Dawson, 3819 Fort street, at 10 Tuesday night, and searched the house for liquor, according to police reports. Dawson told police the men flashed a search warrant on him, threw him on a bed, buried him with blankets and quilts, and took two \$20 bills from his pockets. They found no liquor, he told police.

Harold Marr, 2107 Farnam street, reported to police that two well dressed bandits held him up at Twentieth and Davenport streets, late Tuesday night and robbed him of \$38 and his watch.

Three More Burglaries

Three burglaries were reported to police in the night. Clothes valued at \$200 were stolen from the home of James Hamilton, 809 South Eighteenth street. A diamond pin valued at \$75 was among the loot taken by the thief, who entered Hamilton's home by means of a pass key.

Fred Riva, 1327 South Twenty-first street, reported to police the theft of a gun, two overcoats and other clothing from his home. Entrance was gained by breaking open the front door. The family was asleep at the time, Mr. Riva said.

Policeman Bugiewicz found a side window of the Sobokier cigar store, 2006 Farnam street, broken open at 2 yesterday morning.

Detail Extra Men

Police heads have detailed two more detectives to work nights, besides keeping two motorcycle policemen in reserve at Central police station for emergency calls. "The police department is now ready and able to cope with any situation that may arise," declared Chief of Police Eberstein yesterday as he showed the mechanism of two new Prowling machine guns of the heaviest type which have been added to the riot equipment of the department.

The police department is on a business footing now. Those guns will shoot 600 bullets a minute. They cost \$800 each and they will never have to be used. The mere sight of them will be enough to quell a mob. We have two men who saw machine gun service in France who will be in command of the machine gun squads.

"Best in History"

"Yes, sir," continued the chief, "I am optimistic enough to declare that the police department of Omaha is better today than it has ever been in its history. The morale of the men could not be better. It is mighty close to 100 per cent." "Where are the machine guns going to be used?" the chief was asked. "I won't tell you that," he said. "The policemen are all armed now with Colt 45 caliber revolvers instead of the various weapons of many types which they formerly had."
