**Removing Ink from Carpet.**  
If just spilled ink may be removed by taking cotton batting and sopping as much up as possible. Then take clean batting, dip in milk and keep sopping up, changing the cotton often. Then rub until the spot disappears. Now wash in warm water and a little soap, rinse and rub dry.

If dried in it cannot be removed unless on a white spot. You may use salt or lemon juice and starch. This will remove it easily.
