Services Recognized.

Emphasizing his belief that officers ngaged in hazardous and responsie duties in the North sea mining quadron, the destroyer force, the convoy and the armed guard serv-ces should be given preference in he award of high honors over officers serving on shore, even in posiions of great responsibility, and ofheers serving with ships in home waters, Secretary Daniels said that the services rendered by these different forces was recognized by the oard of awards in assigning certain medals to the officers in command of the ships and stations concerned nd this plan of procedure met with approval.




