

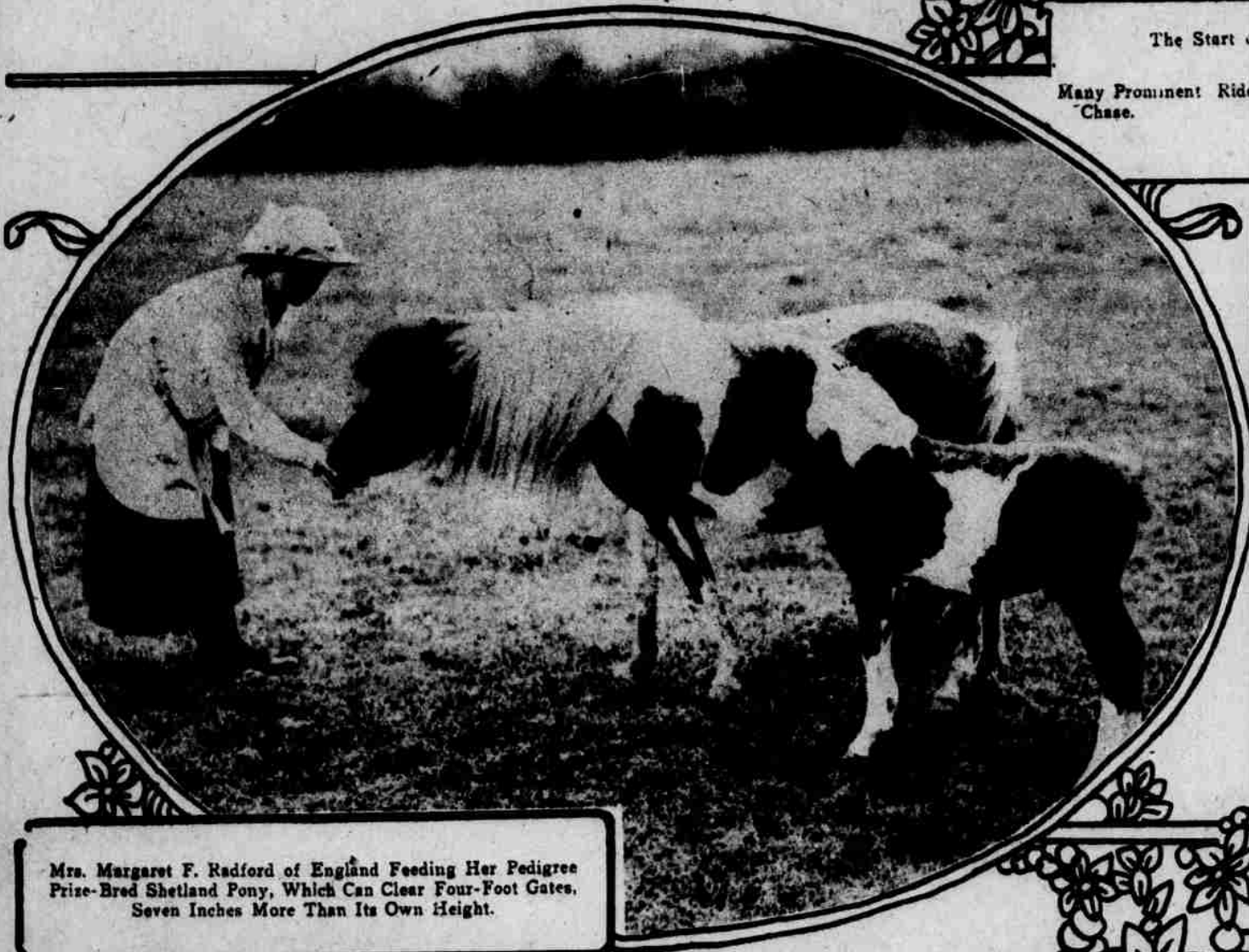
The Start of a Fox Hunt on Long Island.

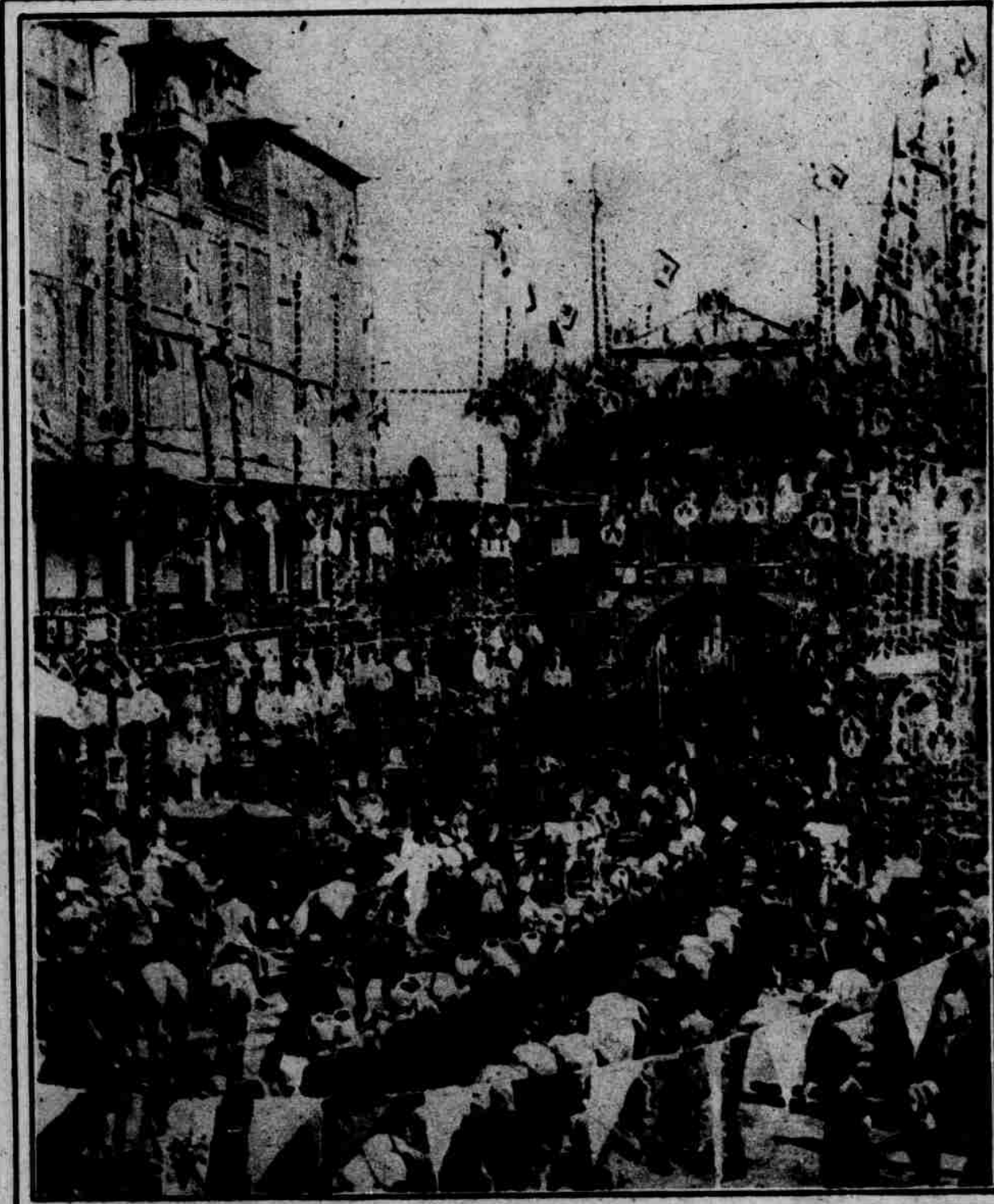
