

## EAST DEFEATS WEST IN HARDLY CONTESTED GAME

### Harvard Vanquishes University of Oregon, 7 to 6, in Intersectional Contest At Pasadena.

Pasadena, Cal., Jan. 1.—The east vanquished the west here Thursday when Harvard defeated the University of Oregon, 7 to 6, in the annual intersectional football game.

The versatile attack of the easterners, based on smashing straight front tactics, but saturated with forward passes, tricks and punts, was met by stalwart defense from Oregon. The fighting qualities of the western defenders were exemplified to the last minute of play when Harvard, separated by inches from a second touchdown, was held for downs.

Harvard's points were scored on a touchdown by Church and a goal kicked by A. Horween. Steers, the bright star of the Oregon team, kicked one goal from field and Mauernd, who replaced him later in the game, again sent the ball hurtling between the goal posts for a field goal.

**Rival Steers as Stars.**

Jacobberger punting and Mauernd's steers as stars of the Oregon aggregation. The support rendered by their teammates was of the best. Steers punted and kicked the line in a manner that made him the favorite of the Oregon supporters and when he was forced out by an injury and Mauernd went in, the latter ran like a demon, punted in remarkable fashion, considering his small size and weight and bucked the line so strongly that he hurled through time after time.

For Harvard the Horweens were the bright particular stars, while Eddie Casey, their teammate back of the line worked hard and successfully. There was no development of any particular style of play, both teams using the forward pass, punting, line formations, a few trick plays and all their usual tactics.

**Superior Team Work.**

Harvard's victory was probably due as much to superior team work as to any single factor. Their superior weight seemed to have little to do with it, judging from the way their opponents held their line smashes. Speed was equally divided, the backs of the opposing teams seeming to get over the line with equal facility. In interference and blocking the easterners had a shade the better of it, according to press experts, but the teams were so evenly matched that there was little choice in any particular.

The greatest crowd ever assembled at Tournament park was gathered for the event. The park seated more than 30,000 people and general admissions for standing room only ran up to approximately 35,000, according to officials. The day was perfect, a slight haze overcasting the sun, not sufficiently to obscure the view of the field from any seat, but enough to prevent heat exhaustion troubling the players.

## "STOVE LEAGUE" OF SIMON PURES ALREADY ACTIVE

### Managers Discussing Plans For 1920 Season; Nebraska Powers to Play In Class C.

With many of the "Stove Leaguers" still talking over the events of the past and the season still several months hence, a number of the amateur base ball players and managers are already discussing plans for the 1920 amateur base ball season.

The first announcement regarding the 1920 season was made yesterday by Sam Moore, well-known in local amateur base ball circles, to the effect that the Nebraska Power company, members of the Greater Omaha league last season, has entered the City class B league, taking the franchise of the Omaha Printing company.

According to an announcement by Moore, many of the players of the Union Outfitting company team, last season's city class B champions, have attached their signatures to contracts with the Power company. Moore will be business manager of the team.

### Seventh Cavalry Defeats Fifth Cavalry at Foot Ball

El Paso, Jan. 1.—The Seventh Cavalry foot ball team defeated the Fifth Cavalry from Maria here Thursday in a fast game, 18 to 0. The Seventh now claims the southern department army championship for teams playing as regimental organizations.

### Need New Team.

If the Union Outfitting Co. is represented this season it will be forced to sign up an entirely new team. Last season the Powers had a good Class A team, but could not make the grade in comparison with the Murphy-Did-Its, so it was decided by the firm to put a Class B team in the field for the coming year.

The Omaha Printing Co. finished in last place in the city league. However the printing company will be represented by a Class C team again next year. This season the Class C boys were known as the Omaha Print Juniors, the word junior will be dropped next season.

Since the Power Co. has decided the season, now believes in the old saying, "The early bird catches the worm," and has already signed a team to play Class B ball, many of last season's players will sign up with other Class A teams. Practically all of the other teams in the city league, the H. R. Bowens, Mickel Victorias, Nebraska Storage Battery, McCaffrey Motors and Union Outfitting Co. will be back in the field during the 1920 season, but several of the teams will be under new management.

Organization of leagues for next season will start probably the middle of February, but it is thought that many of the teams will be organized and ready for practice long before the snow leaves the ground.

Toledo retaliated in the second period. After a series of criss-cross and line plays down the field, Andrews scored on a modification of the criss-cross, and Scharer kicked goal, tying the score, 7 to 7.

Toledo brought the spectators to their feet a few minutes before the game ended by pushing the ball to within six inches of the Everett goal. ## South Side SHOOT SELF ON NEW YEAR'S CALL

### Packing House Workman in Critical Condition—Brother Unable to Explain His Act.

According to the story told the police, Steve Zokich, with his brother Pevo, left home to make a few New Year's calls and their first visit was at the home of Chedo Buszo, across the alley from the Zokich home. The brothers were met at the door by Buszo, who said, "I greet you."

Steve Zokich is said to have drawn a revolver and after firing two shots into the floor, turned the weapon upon himself, firing one shot into his left breast, just below the heart. He was attended by Drs. Miller and Young, after which he was removed to St. Joseph's hospital, with slight chances of recovery, according to the physicians.

Pevo Zokich said he knew of no reason why his brother shot himself and the wounded man was too weak to make a statement. The brothers are employed in the packing houses.
