Recommend Increases of 30 to 50 Per Cent in Enlisted Navy Men's Pay

Washington, Jan. 10.—The house naval committee voted unanimously to recommend increases of 30 to 50 per cent in the pay of enlisted men in the navy, and advances ranging from \$240 to \$840 a year for officers.

For enlisted men, the committee proposes a monthly rate base pay as follows: Chief petty officers with acting appointments, \$99; permanent, \$126; petty officers, first class, \$84; second class, \$72; third class, \$60; non-rated men, first class, \$54; second class, \$48; third class, \$36.

Avalanches Destroy Villages And Kill Many in Italy

Rome, Jan. 10.—Stories of avalanches are reaching Rome. One of them destroyed several houses in a small village. Thirteen persons were killed by another, and in the village of Ayes, near Aosta, seven persons were killed. Traffic on the Simplon railway between Premila and Varzo has been interrupted.

VICTOR BERGER AGAIN DENIED SEAT IN HOUSE

Washington, Jan. 10.—Victor Berger, Milwaukee socialist, re-elected from the Fifth Wisconsin congressional district after he had been refused membership in the house "because he gave aid and comfort to the enemy," found he was denied his seat again today by a vote of 228 to 6.

Minnesota Governor Again Changes Mind on Requisition

St. Paul, Minn., Jan. 10.—(Special Telegram)—Extradition of William and Mike Finn, brothers, to Omaha, where they are wanted to face a charge of robbing the Benson State bank of \$115,000, was halted again by Governor Burquist late Saturday.

PROPOSALS COME FROM EACH SIDE OVER PACT ISSUE

Efforts to Break Senate Deadlock Advanced a Fed Steps By Members.

Washington, Jan. 10.—Efforts to break the senate peace treaty deadlock and keep the treaty out of the political campaign were advanced a step when republican senators advocating ratification drew up a counter proposal to the set of compromise reservations submitted to them early in the week by a group of democrats.

The republican proposal, to which its sponsors said Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, the party leader, had given tentative assent, was understood to deal only with some of the collateral issues in the reservation controversy, leaving to future negotiation the troublesome questions of Article X, and equality of voting power in the league of nations.

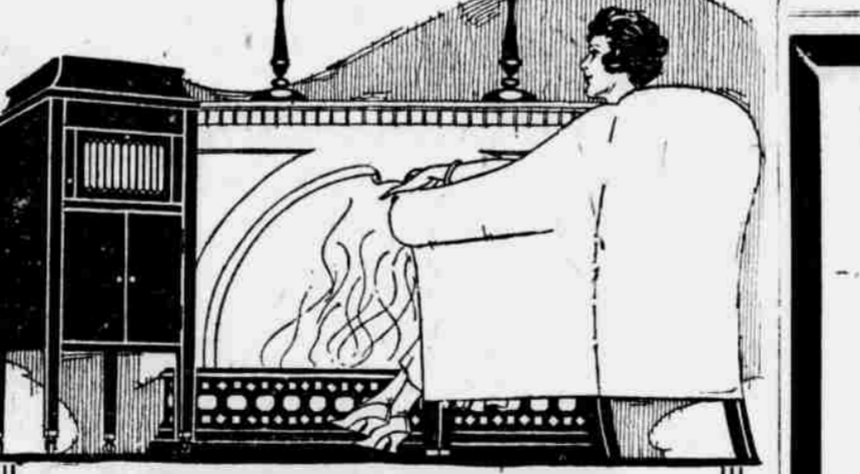
