National Thrift week will be celebrated throughout this country January 17-24. The United States goverument has requested its universal observance by all organizations. It has especially requested the co-oper-ation of the General Federation of Women's clubs, with its more than 2,000,000 members, to drive home the need of national thrift in all the departments of life. Miss Georgie A. Bacon, 37 Dean street, Worcester, Mass., director of thrift work in the general federation, has a complete organization in 42 states, so that thrift meetings will be held in every county and community in them at the appointed time. Miss Bacor has laid especial emphasis on thrift in the home, in that 70 per cent of the com-mon buying of this country is done by women, principally housewives. She has also prepared a decalogue on thrift for the American housewife and her family to follow, and it is upon these that the meetings will base their discussions. The "com-


