WHISKY STILL IN OPERATION

Two Men Arrested in Building Used as Distillery-Had 10-Gallon Daily Capacity.

A moonshine whisky still, with copper boiler and worm and all the demanding the extension of governother paraphernalia of a first-class plant, was captured yesterday by Council Bluffs police. Two men who, police charge, were operating the plant were arrested. Six gallons of white whisky and four barrels of mash in various stages of fermentation were seized.

The plant was located in a three oom shack at the corner of North Fifteenth street and Avenue N, and was vacant with the exception of the whisky-making apparatus. Roy Walker and W. D. Robinson were arrested. Both men were armed, but offered no resistance and denied any responsibility for the plant. Walker said he just "happened" in and later in the day he was released on \$300 bond to appear for hearing in police

The still is the most complete that has been found in this vicinity. A three-burner oil stove furnished the heat for the 20-gallon copper still. and its contents were still at the proper &mperature to carry the alcohol through the worm into a 10gallon keg. The barrels of mash comprised corn, raisins and grapes. The still had a capacity of about 10 gallons of whisky daily.


