How to Make Up The Dolly Sisters

Making Up the Eye Lashes and Eye Brows.

Do not attempt to make up the eyes until every particle of powder has been brushed out of the brows and lashes.

If by any chance the powder and grease have clung to the brows, making them caked—use a bit of white hazel on a soft camel-hair brush and brush them lightly. This will take out oil and powder.

Eye black is an important factor in making up. The smallest, most unattractive eyes can be made lovely by the careful use of the right kind of cosmetic.

Buy a black grease paint that you are certain is pure to use on the eyelashes. The hard cakes of black and brown that must be wet before the brush is applied, break and burn the hair till the lashes are anything but lovely.

The grease cakes can be bought in the same style of boxes as the

hard cakes, with the small camel's hair brush inside. Or it can be bought in sticks, wrapped in tinfoil.

The handiest way to keep it is to break up the stick of eye grease and jam it down into a small round box, kneading it till it is soft and smooth on top.

If you prefer a brush with which to apply the black, WASH IT EVERY TIME you use it. This is essential.

Some prefer the orangewood stick with which to apply the brush to the lashes. If you use a brush half close the eye and brush the upper lashes with an upward movement.

This will make them grow, just as brushing the hair helps it. It will also give the lashes a slight curl, which is most becoming.

Do not neglect to use the brush on the top of the upper eyelashes, especially if you have brown lashes and are using black paint to make your eyes look larger.

If the lower lash is of light growth and too short to brush use the orangewood stick upon them. Do not use the black line at the corner of the eyes, draw back toward the hair, to enlarge them. This is all right upon the stage, but it looks affected and cheap on the street.

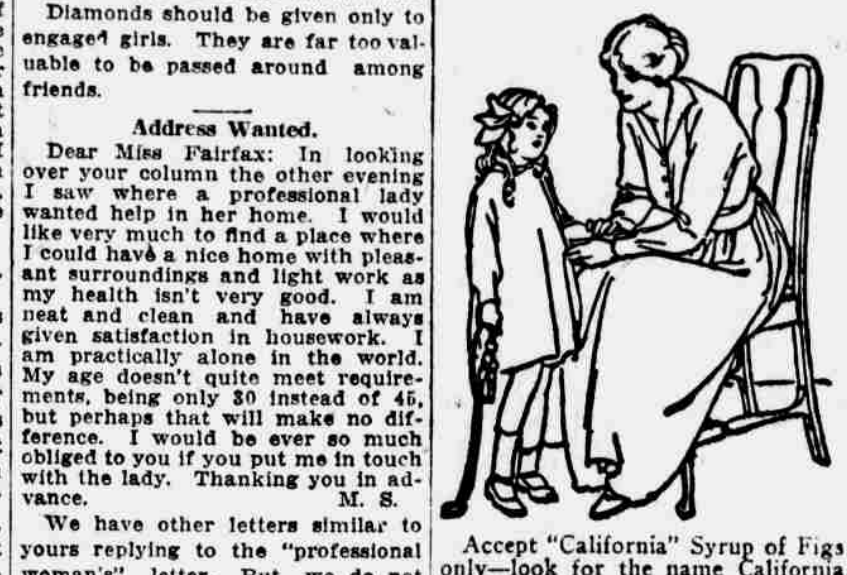
